## HOW TO GET YOUR HENS TO MAKE THICKER EGG SHELLS

In the "Poultry Raising" department of the current issue of Farm and Fireside a contributor tells us follows how to feed hens in order that their egg shells may be tougher and stronger:

"Most of us know that plenty of oyster shell is necessary for our hens. If the egg shells are to stand the jolts of transportation. But lime is not the only shell-making material needed. The chemist has found that phosphorus and magnesia are both necessary for tough, solid egg shells. "Ground or granulated kiln-dried bone supplies phosphorus, and grains as a rule give sufficient magnesia. Ground bone is also important in furnishing the phosphorus that is found abundantly in the yolk."

## FOREST NOTES

Lodgepole pine, one of the principal trees of the Rocky Mountains, makes good wrapping paper and pulp board.

Osage orange wood is a source of dye and can be used to supplement the imported rustic wood, as a permanent yellow for textiles.

News print paper has been made by the forest reserve laboratory from 24 different woods, and a number compare favorably with standard spruce pulp paper.

The forest service is cooperating with 54 railroads, mining companies, pole companies, and cities in making tests of wooden ties, timbers, poles, piling, and paving blocks which have been given preservation treatments.
