## MARSHFIELD WINS DOUBLE HEADERS

### Basket Ball Games Open New Gymnasium — Bleachers Crowded to Limit

Feminine shrieks, male crescendos in booming high school yells—and the new \$10,000 high school gymnasium had started on its first initiation last evening with a double header of basket ball.

The opening game, between the North Bend Independents and the Marshfield Independents, resulted in an "indiscriminate slaughter" of the former, for after the first stages of a game that promised to be hard fought some one rocked the boat and the visitors from then on were unable to hit the basket, the final score being 44 to 7. In the second game the Marshfield High School proved the victors over the North Bend quintet 18 to 9.

By 8 o'clock the gallery was crowded with 200 spectators, many of them being North Bend rooters gathered in the west end of the bleachers in an organized rooting section, the local boys taking the east end.

The North Bend Independents secured a basket and shot a foul before the local five broke through the defense. Dr. Morrow evened the score with a similar procedure and from then on the local Independents held the lead.

Noticeable was the added strength and wind necessary to traverse the long 70-foot gym floor. To the men of both teams it was a new experience and near the close of the second half the passing became slower and the defense of the visitors collapsed utterly, Marshfield often having four men under her basket, taking turns at the tossing.

Dr. Morrow, playing at guard for Marshfield, played with an eagle eye, missing but few trials. Out of 11 fouls he threw ten good ones. "Breakwater" Landers, during the first half was a good running mate for Morrow, being succeeded later by Buffington, of Idaho, who proved an extremely efficient addition, his passes being long and accurate. Fisher, at center, was able to get the ball on the toss-up over Van Zile, North Bend's pivot, though the latter put up a game fight often. The same may be said of all the visitors' men. They played clean ball despite the fact that they were overwhelmed by men of more practice.
