The plants add a welcome touch of color to the building. Fined for Fighting.—For fighting yesterday with W. R. Foote in the police court this afternoon P. M. Thurston paid a fine of \$15. Mr. Foote is in bed and was unable to come, his case being postponed until he is able to come into court. One More in Toils.—A Berg was found wandering about the streets last night in an unsafe condition and was locked in the city jail over night to sober up. He came before Judge Butler this morning and paid a \$5 fine for being drunk. Coal to Eureka.—On her last trip south, the Geo. W. Elder took about fifty tons of coal from the Libby mine consigned to a dealer at Eureka. Formerly considerable Coos Bay coal was shipped to Eureka, but recently the traffic in it has been light. Where is Goldstein?—This is the question asked of Chief of Police Carter over the long distance telephone this afternoon. A junk dealer, supposed to be from Eugene, is missing and a search is now being made. He was last heard of at Florence and it is thought he might have met foul play while on the road. To Go East.—Harry Bradford has received a letter from his brother-in-law, Fremont King, of Ketchikan, Alaska, stating that he has been chosen as the Alaska and Seattle delegate to a meeting in Washington, D. C. Mrs. King will accompany him East and they will return via Florida and California, taking in the two expositions en route. Will Talk at Library.—Professor Orrin F. Stafford, professor of chemistry at the University of Oregon, and state chemist, will deliver a lecture at eight o'clock this evening in the library on the subject, "World Information," illustrated with lantern slides. Professor Stafford is an interesting lecturer and a welcome one to come and hear him. Prizes Awarded.—The contest over the reading of the rebus in the display window of E. F. LeMieux on North Front street closed Monday and prizes were awarded yesterday. There was a large number of answers but only four solved it correctly. They were Harry Allen, Roy Lawhorne, M. C. Maloney and Tom Harvey. Fellowship Club Meets.—The Fellowship Club will hold their monthly meeting this evening at 8 o'clock in the Chamber of Commerce. This time the customary banquet has been dispensed with because of the several interesting and live subjects that have been prepared for consideration. There will be matters of importance discussed at the business meeting and President J. C. Kendall asks that all members be present. Salmon Trout Jumping.—Salmon trout in the upper Coos River have begun jumping and anglers state that with another week of fair weather the fishing will be at its best. The season is open the year round on salmon trout and also on other trout more than ten inches in length. The regular fishing season will open April 1 according to the state law. Salmon trout are not protected under the state law. To Adjust Differences.—The final action of the meeting held yesterday afternoon of the property owners on Anderson avenue who sought some means of straightening out the avenue was to leave the matter rest as far as a second meeting is concerned until the property owners who will be affected have had time to adjust the differences in the changing of lots. Near the intersection of Seventh street and Anderson avenue there is a maximum of 34 feet taken from some lots and placed on others. May Await Legislative Bill.—That the state Supreme Court is awaiting the outcome of a bill now before the Legislature to abolish the

office of County Judge before they make their decision relative to the term of County Judges is the belief of Judge Hall, who went to Coquille this morning on court business. He believes there can be no other reason for holding up the decision so long after the first of the year. Boatmen Perplexed.—The mandates of the new \$100,000 war revenue tax is almost universal; it touches even the gasoline boats that ply on the bay carrying freight. Many of the boatmen are puzzled regarding the law and many different versions have been taken of the use of revenue stamps. As the law reads all shippers of freight on bay boats and on which the freight charge is more than five cents, must attach to the package or parcel a one cent revenue stamp. This charge is not paid by the boatman, though they must keep a receipt of all such packages, this to be shown the revenue inspector at any time they may ask for it. Build Apartments.—Miss Mary Clark has let the contract for the erection of a two-story apartment house on Elrod avenue near Sixth street. The site is part of the old Merchant homestead which she bought last year. The house will have one apartment on each story. Clark, Lupton and Simmons received the general contract and the Marshfield Hardware Co. the plumbing contract. B. B. Ostland is the architect. The apartment will be modern in every way and will be very attractive. While the figures on the contract are not given, it is said that they are much lower than the cost would have been had it been built last season. Joke on Travelers.—O. A. Mintonye was over from Coquille today and was telling a good joke on F. V. Catterlin and Archie Johnston. They were at Port Orford the other day when Lex Cope, a well known Curry county dairyman, and Miss Hazel Manwaring, who is a cheese factory expert, passed through en route south.
