SAYS MINE TOWNS ARE UNDER DESPOT

Claims Rockefeller Company Owns Houses, Church and Other Buildings

[By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.] NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—John R. Lawson, executive board member for Colorado of the United Mine Workers of America, who yesterday denounced conditions in the Colorado mining camps before the Industrial Relations Commission and arraigned John D. Rockefeller, Jr., for alleged failure to inform himself as to conditions, continued his testimony today. "The companies own all the houses, grounds, schools, churches and stores," he said. "A complete despotism exists. If they complain, it is down the canyon for the employes."

TO RAISE BEAVER IN COOS COUNTY

Deputy Game Warden Dowell Sends Three From Siuslaw to C. A. Lagerstrom

(Special to The Times.) FLORENCE, Or., Jan. 30.—State Game Warden Overton Dowell, Jr., has shipped one male and two female beavers to C. A. Lagerstrom at Marshfield. The three animals are to be placed on the C. A. Smith Timber Company's tract which has been made a state game reservation. They were captured on the Siuslaw River, some miles above Florence in the state game reservation after several days' efforts by Warden Dowell and his deputies. Several large families of beavers are reported along the river and creeks in this reserve and as high as twenty were counted in one group. The capture of the beavers was accomplished without injury through the use of protected traps. They were carefully crated and on display for several hours on the Bay View Hotel docks, attracting many visitors who had never seen them before. They will be used for the propagation of the species in Coos county.

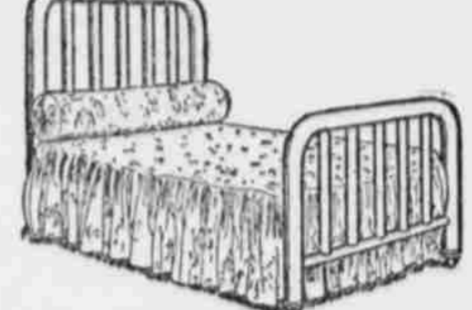

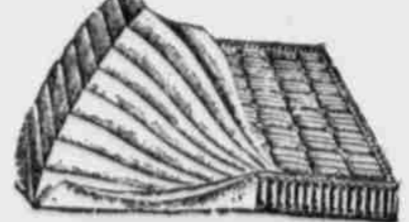
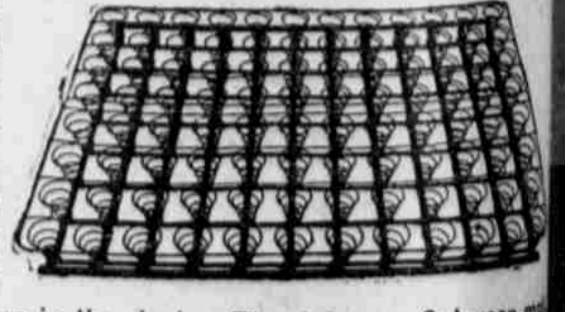
