Two papers were prepared, one by Mrs. James Ebbeka and another by Mrs. W. F. McEldowney, both of which were highly commended for the able treatment they gave to the subject of the teaching of the Bible in the schools.

Mention was made of the splendid system which obtained in New York City, where the Bible was put into the schools and excellent results followed. No book takes a higher stand in all literature than does the Bible as a treasure house of literary beauty. The main object of the teaching of the Bible, however, is to place its moral teachings in the hands of the young of the land.

Mrs. McEldowney's paper dealt with the subject at home, "What can be done for the boys of Marshfield in the way of affording Sunday afternoon instruction in the Bible." The speaker strongly advocated the forming of a municipal Sunday Bible instruction class to meet in the Marshfield library auditorium, with business men and practical Christian workers as the leaders of the class from week to week.

A short discussion followed the excellent papers and then a motion was passed that a committee, consisting of one from each church and club in Marshfield, together with a representative from the schools, be asked to meet on Saturday next in the afternoon at Guild Hall, to devise some definite means for starting a movement in favor of a municipal Sunday school and to try and get the Bible placed in the public schools.

After refreshments had been served and a social time enjoyed, the meeting adjourned with general satisfaction all around. Much credit is due to Mrs. Harry Nasburg in arranging these monthly programs, to be held on the last Tuesday of each month.
