Senate Committee Smith's Bill-Crabs and Beer Discussed

SALEM, Or., Feb. 1 .- The Senate committee on assessment and taxation decided to report unfavorably the bill of Senator Smith, representing Coos and Curry counties, repealing the law providing for the publication in newspapers of the names of persons delinquent in the payment of taxes.

Senator Smith, who is a member of the committee, will submit a minority the committee, submitted a minority report which was voted down in the

New Dental Bill.

Should two bills, introduced in the House by Rrepresentative Paisley, become laws, it will be an offense for any person engaged in the practice of dentistry to perform any dental operation unless there is present a competent woman assistant or nurse, and also unlawful for a dentist to use or have in his possession any arsenic or cocaine, or its salts. For the violation of both a fine is provided for the first offense, imprisonment in the county jail for the second, and both fine and imprisonment and revocation of license for the third offense.
