TAX LISTS MUST BE PUBLISHED

Senate Committee Kills Smith's Bill—Crabs and Beer Discussed

SALEM, Or., Feb. 1.—The Senate committee on assessment and taxation decided to report unfavorably the bill of Senator Smith, representing Coos and Curry counties, repealing the law providing for the publication in newspapers of the names of persons delinquent in the payment of taxes.

New Dental Bill

Should two bills, introduced in the House by Representative Paisley, become laws, it will be an offense for any person engaged in the practice of dentistry to perform any dental operation unless there is present a competent woman assistant or nurse, and also unlawful for a dentist to use or have in his possession any arsenic or cocaine, or its salts.

To Raise Salaries

A proposed measure being considered would increase the salaries of county treasurers from \$1200 to \$1800 or \$2000 per year.

Barrow's New Bills

Limit on Liquor

After a long-drawn-out fight over the draft of the prohibition bill in the joint committee on alcoholic traffic, which has been waged in the committee for the past two weeks, it was finally decided to fix the amount of liquor which will be allowed to be shipped into the state from the outside, when the prohibition amendment to the constitution goes into effect, January 1, 1916.
