BARTON CASE UP SOON

Coos County Assault Trial at Roseburg February 15.

C. F. McKnight is expected here within a day or two from San Francisco, where he has spent a couple of months to prepare for the defense of J. S. Barton, former Coos County Representative, who is charged with assault on Miss Madge Yoakam, a former employee of his abstract office. Barton was convicted on the first trial in Coquille, but this was reversed by the Supreme Court and will be heard by Judge Hamilton at Roseburg on a change of venue.

The case is slated for trial February 15. The state has had C. McCurdy, Miss Inez Bunch, Mrs. Machado, Madge Yoakam, Mrs. Lucy E. Fisher and Sarah Eachus, now at Alhambra, California, summoned as its witnesses. Mrs. Machado is the mother of Miss Yoakam.

HAUSER ACCUSED OF BOOTLEGGING

Charged With Selling Beer to Bunker Hill Men Sunday—Trial Tomorrow

Joe Hauser was placed under arrest today by Chief of Police Carter on a charge of bootlegging, the complaint alleging that Hauser sold beer to Emil Gidmark, delivering it at the Ferndale Laundry, where Hauser is located. The complaint states that money was promised for the beer. Hauser appeared before Judge Butler this morning and pleaded not guilty through his attorney, C. I. Reigard, and the case was set for Wednesday morning at 2 o'clock. A bond of \$100 was put up by R. C. Cordes, Jr., and C. W. Viers. At one time Hauser was head of the Ferndale Brewing Company.

Stop to Drink.

Hauser's arrest resulted from a party of Bunker Hill men stopping on the wharf yesterday to take a drink. Marshal Carter saw them

coming up the street acting suspiciously. He followed them and as he rounded the corner to the wharf he saw them about to take a drink out of a bottle. When they saw him, they started to run.

Gidmark was first caught and four bottles of beer were found on him. Two others who were with him were not caught. He said that they were Ernest Grandell and Gus Peterson. He told Marshal Carter that each of them had four bottles of beer and they bought it from Hauser at price fixed at \$2 per bottle. Gidmark did not like to tell, but Marshal Carter insisted and he finally came through. Gidmark, Grandell and Peterson will not be prosecuted if their story be substantiated in court.

Hauser maintains he is innocent and that the beer was swiped from his bottling factory in the rear of the laundry.

ARGUE DISMISSAL MOTION

Judge Coke, in Equity Court, Hears Land Contract Now in Dispute

A motion on behalf of the defendants to dismiss a suit brought to foreclose a purchase contract involving \$7000 worth of farm property has been heard before Judge Coke, the case being Jacob Matson, wife and others versus L. H. Heisner and others.

According to the plaintiffs the contract for the purchase of land had not been lived up to, they claiming that back interest has not been paid.

The defendants showed that they had made three payments of interest and in fact had paid in more than \$1000 than was due by the contract until 1914. The suit brought was for the foreclosure of the purchase contract and the forfeiture of the \$3000 already paid. The decision has not yet been handed down by Judge Coke.

GARDINER WANTS ROAD TO DRAIN

Commercial Club Petitions the County Court—New Bank Building is Planned

Plans for the building of a county road from Gardiner to Scottsburg and also to Lakeside, were placed on foot at a meeting Friday evening of the Gardiner Commercial Club, according to J. E. Montgomery, commercial superintendent of the telephone company, who returned Saturday afternoon from a business visit in the north.

With the road complete from Scottsburg into Drain the Gardiner people believe that they are entitled to a through routing and petitions have been forwarded to the Douglas County Court asking that funds be appropriated for this project, which would allow quick access to the railroad through Drain.

At the present time the First National Bank of Gardiner is being housed in a rented structure and now the bank officers are preparing plans for the erection of a new building into which they expect to move some time during the summer.

For about a month the commercial club at Gardiner has been organized, according to Mr. Montgomery, and the members are busily engaged in attending various projects in the interests of the city. New sidewalks are being built and with the mill again running full time, business there has picked up considerably. Better telephone service with Gardiner and Florence is now possible, states Mr. Montgomery, the three companies along the coast having greatly improved their service.
