**Locates Dog.**—A Mr. Larson lost a fox terrier pup, inserted a want ad in The Times and this afternoon Mrs. Doll phoned in from Libby that a stray fox terrier pup had wandered out that section. Mr. Larson will probably recover his canine at once.

**Will Open Tomorrow.**—The Fashion store has completed its removal from North Bend into the store room in the Coke building which has been entirely remodeled and refitted and expects to be open for business tomorrow. The formal opening will take place later.

**Railroad Men Return.**—W. D. Kerr and J. E. Nelson left this morning up the beach for Glenada and Mableton after a trip of inspection over the Willamette Pacific south of Gardiner. Mr. Kerr is the purchasing agent of Porter Brothers, who have the contract for the building of the road, and has been with the company for the last ten years.

**Change Dates.**—A wire was received from the Bandon High School yesterday afternoon stating that the date of their game with the Marshfield High School has been changed from Friday to Saturday night. This puts off the Myrtle Point contest until Friday, with Bandon there, the next evening. Coach Niles, according to this change, will be unable to play in Coquille Friday night with the Independent quintet.

**"Doe Sisters" Freed.**—Because the two prosecuting witnesses were out of the city, the "Doe Sisters," namely Alice Holden and Sadie Bair, have been freed in Judge Butler's Police Court on the charge of selling liquor in the Palms Rooming House without a license. Two pseudo detectives, Stewart and Boberg, alleged that they had seen the women sell liquor there, and in fact had bought it there. They are now said to be in the north "detecting." A more serious charge against the

slaters is now pending for the grand jury investigation in April, the evidence for this case is also said to depend on the testimony of the two detectives.

**Steamers Delayed.**—The steamers waiting in the lower Bay for a favorable opportunity to cross out did not get out today. The Speedwell is now at North Bend and the Daisy Putnam is tied up at Empire.

**Will Go To Washington.**—Miss Lempi A. Maniki and Fred V. Oman were married Saturday evening by Rev. Bengtson at his home and after spending a few days in the city the young people are planning on a short stay at the home of the bride at Ten Mile and then will later go to Washington, where they will settle down. **Pay Penny for Messages.**—As a wrong interpretation of the new war revenue tax the telephone company company complains that many persons in bringing their messages that cost more than 15 cents are placing a war stamp on the message when it should be paid in coin. James Montgomery, commercial superintendent, estimates that \$20 was lost last month by this means. Unless the tax is paid in coin the company must make the payment to the government.

**Glad He Didn't Go.**—E. H. Joehnk is congratulating himself on the fact that he did not go to San Francisco when the call came for the old Oregon crew, of which he is a member. The news has come now that the trip through the Panama Canal is indefinitely postponed until some time in the summer. A great many of the old battleship's crew reported in San Francisco and there heard for the first time that the trip would not take place at once. Some of them had come hundreds of miles, having left their families and business.

**Barnacle on Parade.**—Resplendent in new paint the Barnacle, the strange craft that will bear three men to South America in search of gold, today came up the bay and made fast at the dock in the rear of the fire station. She is about 40 feet in length, has a wide beam and is provided with a 24-horse-power engine, and is schooner rigged on her two masts. The owners are now living aboard. They are Frank Harris, D. M. Post and W. S. Wilson. Today they were to take the boat out over the bar, but conditions would not allow. It is expected the little craft will leave in about two weeks. There is a neat cabin and galley, besides the engine room.

### WATERFRONT NEWS

Reports from the lighthouse this afternoon were that the bar is breaking clear across with high seas running on the outside.  
Not until this morning did the George W. Elder arrive in Eureka, according to word received from there this morning and it is probable that she will not arrive in here until sometime tomorrow. On her trip from Portland the Elder bucked a high wind from the south that detained her several hours and after leaving here for Eureka is supposed to have faced again into the gale that had then increased in velocity.  
Tomorrow morning the Redondo is due to arrive in from San Francisco. Her agents state that on her second trip out of here, about February 20, that the Redondo will go south to San Francisco, San Pedro and San Diego.  
At 12:30 the Breakwater crossed in from Portland after facing a blow all the way down the coast. Because of bar conditions the Speedwell was unable to cross out for San Francisco at noon today. Her sailing has been postponed until tomorrow afternoon at four o'clock.  
It was reported at the Arrow Line dock this afternoon that the Daisy crossed out for Portland though she has no wireless, and this report was not verified.  
The Daisy Putnam is waiting to leave for San Francisco, the Rustler for the Rogue River and the Roamer for Florence.

## NORTHLAND HURT BY BAD STORM

Portland Steamer Aided by Nann Smith Near Mendocino—Adeline Smith In

Reporting the roughest weather he has experienced in many years, Capt. B. W. Olson arrived in with the Adeline Smith from Bay Point yesterday. He stated that when he left San Francisco, it was stated that the Golden Gate was experiencing the roughest weather known there in twenty years, the bar breaking badly and causing many vessels to remain in port. The A. M. Simpson started out but when Capt. Bendergard sighted the rough seas, he put back to wait for better weather.

When he reached Point Arenas, the weather modified considerably. North of Cape Mendocino he sighted the Nann Smith and the Northland, a steam lumber schooner and passenger boat. When about sixty miles north he received a wireless call announcing that the Northland had lost her wheel. The Nann Smith was standing by, but Capt. Magee reported that he had no lines aboard that were heavy enough to take the Northland in tow.

Capt. Olsen immediately put back but soon afterward received another wireless from the Nann Smith stating that the Northland had made temporary repairs and was in no danger, so he turned for Coos Bay again. He thinks that instead of losing her wheel as first reported, the Northland must have suffered trouble with her steering gear. The Northland is about the size of the Saginaw, which formerly plied into Coos Bay, and carries about fifty passengers. She was en route to San Francisco from Portland.

The Nann Smith arrived in at San Francisco at 8 o'clock last night, but whether she towed the Northland in was not stated.

The Adeline found the Coos Bay bar very rough and had to remain outside several hours before she was able to come in. There were no passengers on board.

In a card to one of his former pupils here, under date of January 9, he writes in part:

"I celebrated Christmas in a military hospital in Poland. The Russian scoundrel had made a small hole through my stomach. I am recovering wonderfully quickly and hope to return to the front rapidly. We are going to lick them all and that deservedly."

He asks to be remembered to his many friends on Coos Bay and the former Biltmore boys.
