

October 18, 1853 is the date that Mrs. Lockhart arrived on Coos Bay from the east. She was then 38 years of age, Two other women, Mrs. Dr. Oberbeck and Mrs. Dr. Tolman, accompanied by their husbands also came at that time but left shortly afterward and then for some time Mrs. Lockhart was the INSPECTORS EDWARDS AND FUL. only white woman in this vicinity.

She remembers well the happenings of the Rogue River Indian steamboat investigation at Co- wars of 1855 and 1856. The soldiers came at that time from Portland and Salem to drive the Indians onto their reservation. Most of the soldiers were members of a volunteer state militia, organized by the early settlers for their own protection. They later saw service, many of them, around the missionary settlement of Marcus Whitman near Walla Walla.
