Gets Swimming Medal. — J. W. Watt this morning received for inspection a medal won by his daughter, Alma Watt, aged 24, at the Y. M. C. A. at Portland for her swimming and high diving activities. The young woman is a graduate of the Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland in the class of 1913. She has long been a swimming enthusiast and writes her father that she is soon going to attempt to swim from The Oakes to one of the bridges across the Willamette River, a feat that few swimmers have accomplished.

R. P. Smith Brings His Dog. — For the first time in almost two months R. P. Smith spent a night in jail, drunk. He was picked up on Saturday night, he and his dog, and given a free berth. For a great while R. P. has trodden the straight and narrow and had been almost forgotten by the police when he made his appearance of Saturday evening. He came with his dog, who was also invited to spend the night with his master.

Fix Gym Charges. — At a meeting of the school board held Saturday evening in the office of Judge Hall it was definitely decided that a fee of 50 cents a month will be charged all women using the new gymnasium and the men will pay \$1. The difference in the rates is based on the schedule for the gym, which provides the men shall have it three evenings and two afternoons of the week and the women but two evenings. This is in addition to the hours the building will be in use by the high school students. No time is definitely set for the opening of the gymnasium to the public.
