### BANKERS GO TO PORTLAND

Messrs. Ross and Bugge Return to Portland—Expect to Start Bank Soon.

Messrs. Ross and Bugge, who have been here arranging to start a new state bank, will leave tomorrow for Portland, where they will complete their arrangements. They expect to return within a month. Just how soon they will be ready to start is not certain.

Mr. Ross said that they had been looking at several different locations. He intimated that they would like to make arrangements with some local party to erect a building for them.

Mr. Ross said that on their return the organization would be perfected, and then they would be able to give out the local parties who are associated with them.

It has been reported that they were negotiating with the Merchant estate for a lease of the building formerly occupied by the old First National Bank of Coos Bay on Front Street. However, this is under lease by I. S. Kaufman & Company.

### COMMITTEE OUTLINE CLEAN-UP DISTRICTS

Get All in Readiness for Opening of City Beautiful Movement.

At a meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce late Saturday afternoon the women of the district committees appointed last week mapped out the limits of each of the five districts and put a chairman in charge of each one.

Mrs. W. P. Murphy will have the Central district, between Market and Curtis avenues and Fourth street and the waterfront.

In the south district Mrs. W. E. Hoagland will direct the cleaning up between Curtis avenue and the city limits, Fourth street and the waterfront.

Mrs. A. E. Adelsperger has the southwest district between Fourth street and the city limits and from Donnelly avenue south and in West Marshfield. Mrs. F. W. Payne will take charge between Fourth street and the city limits and from Eighth Terrace to Donnelly avenue.

The north district will be taken in charge by Mrs. A. O. Rogers. This extends from Market avenue to the city limits and from Nob Hill to the western limits. Mrs. M. A. Sweetman will have charge of Ferndale.

### JUDGE COKE HEARS THE MARSDEN-O'DONNELL CASE

Verbal Contract Regarding Two Bunker Hill Lots Brought On Carpet.

Claiming that a verbal contract alleged to have been made with Mrs. Fannie O'Donnell regarding two lots in Bunker Hill called for a purchase price of \$800 Robert Marsden, Sr., today began suit in Judge Coke's equity court asking that the property be at once conveyed to him. Mrs. O'Donnell on the other hand, declared that the offer, made June 21, 1914, stipulated that \$800, cash should be paid for the property, the purchaser also to assume \$321 in mortgages against the land.

Marsden immediately after the verbal contract was made erected a house on the land. This he rented and on January 13 Mrs. O'Donnell went to the place and threatened to maltreat the inmates with a baseball club. With her husband, she kept watch all day on the front porch until Constable Cox arrived with a warrant for her arrest. This charge is still unsettled in the Circuit Court.
