SPOTLIGHT AGAIN ON COOS BAY CRAB

Canning Open to All is Senator Smith's Interpretation of New Measure

Coos Bay crabs, mute animals that crawl the slimy sea, have, through the Barrow Crab Law, elicited more attention in the past two weeks that ever before in the history of the Bay. A letter from Senator I. S. Smith, at Salem, addressed to J. Tom Hall, explains the machine-like grinding out of laws in the Legislature, one of which affected the local sea delicacies. "I will say," he writes, "that we do not care anything about it whether or not a bill is unconstitutional. We put them through just the same and let the Supreme Court do the rest. I presume there is no doubt but that it would be illegal to give one person the privilege of canning crabs and not others, so it may be that others will go into the business. Had we received the protests sooner the bill never would have become a law, but it was pending for three weeks and dozens of copies had been sent to Coos Bay and we never heard a word of protest until after the bill had been signed by the Governor. By this it is taken that Senator Smith interprets the new law as meaning any one may can Coos Bay crabs, a point debated since the passing of the measure some time ago, for on the face of the law it seems mention is made of allowing to operate only canneries opened before a certain date and this would have left T. H. Barry the only person in the field. "I got a bill through exempting women paying a license for the privilege of fishing," writes the Senator, "which I think will be quite satisfactory to our people. Several of my bills have passed both Houses and two of them are still pending in the house."
