AGAIN THE CRAB BILL.
Editor Times:
With your permission, we beg to differ with Mr. Barrow in his defense of the crab bill in February 9 issue of The Times.

As we understand the bill it will be a hardship on Coos County and Coos Bay in particular. The bill is open to criticism in that it creates a monopoly by exempting from its provisions canneries in operation previous to 1907.

It is surely an outrageously unjust bill that will punish by fine or imprisonment a poor fisherman for shipping a few live crabs to some point in his own state, while it permits a canning company to ship crab meat in unlimited quantities to any point in the world.

Live crabs can be profitably shipped by rail and if they are to be shipped out of the county at all individuals should surely have the same right to ship them in the shell that a company has to ship them out of the shell.

But it is a mistake to ship food products of the nature of crabs and clams out of the county under any circumstances.

We fail to see how a people who

have the interests of their community at heart can sanction a bill, that, in the interest of a few, permits the extermination of a valuable food product which belongs to all of the people.

Not one person in a hundred in Coos County will receive any benefit from this bill and the loss to all the people will greatly exceed the profits received by the few interested in the canneries.

If the cities of Coos County make one half of the growth claimed for them by the boosters, we shall need all the crabs for our own use. The increase in population will create a demand that will exterminate them only too soon. It is idle to say that the ocean is full of crabs and they can not be exterminated.

For the very reason that they were approaching the extermination point the bill of 1907 was passed for their protection. Commercial fishing will exterminate anything.

This is the way we look at it. If Mr. Barrow, or the originators of the crab bill can show where we are in error, they will oblige.

WOMEN TO AID SOLDIERS

Americans Provide Free Canteen at London Depots for Penniless Men.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—Under supervision by American women, canteens are to be established at all the leading railway stations in London where sandwiches, coffee and other light refreshments will be supplied free to soldiers in uniform.

Thousands of soldiers pass through London daily, frequently without sufficient money to buy food. In work at railway stations, the American women who have been looking after stranded Americans and Belgian refugees, have learned of the great need for canteens where the soldiers can be promptly provided with nourishing food without cost. The War Office is so well impressed with the women's plan that its assistance in carrying on the work has been assured.

Mrs. Viola Scott, Mrs. A. T. Stewart, and a score of other American women who have been assisting travelers ever since the opening of the war are the prime movers in the plan and have the backing of the entire American Women's War Relief Committee.

Mrs. Benjamin Lathrop, who is one of the most active workers in the French Emergency Committee organized to supply the immediate needs of hospitals in the north of France, has interested Mrs. H. C. Hoover and many other American women in this particular movement and is collecting generous quantities of ether and other hospital supplies so sadly needed in many of the isolated hospitals near the battle line. Mrs. Lathrop left London this week for an inspection tour in northern France.

The Duchess of Marlborough has accepted the chairmanship of the philanthropic committee of the Society of American Women in London. This already has a number of workrooms established for the employment of women thrown out of work by the war, but the need is so great that a marked extension of this work is planned. Mrs. A. T. Stewart, with the assistance of this committee, has just opened a workroom at 123 Victoria street, where indigent gentlewomen will be afforded an opportunity to earn a living. At present fifty women are employed there, most of them knitting supplies required by the army.

AUSTRALIA AND WAR

Clash There Over Number of Men to Be Furnished England in Struggle.

MELBOURNE, Feb. 19.—An interesting newspaper discussion has arisen in Australia over the question whether the Commonwealth is doing its duty in the number of troops it is sending to the war. Joseph Cook, former Liberal Premier, and Senator E. D. Millen, the former Minister for Defense in Cook's Cabinet, who are now both members of the Opposition, are siding with various papers which charge that Australia is behind Canada, and even New Zealand, in showing its loyalty to the empire. They contend that at least 100,000 men should be dispatched from Australia this year, whereas the Fisher ministry now in power is providing for only 3000 volunteers monthly, in addition to the first contingent of 20,000.

The Minister of Defense, Senator Pearce, declares that the Government is doing all that it can and that by June 1 Australia will be represented at the front or in Egypt—where the first expeditionary force is now in training—by some 40,000 fully equipped soldiers. For reasons of military secrecy the figures shown, the rate of enlistment are not given out. While Minister Pearce asserts that the recruiting is satisfactory, Opposition newspapers charge that the ministry is lax in not providing a stamping and publicity campaign to stir up latent patriotism.

WILHELMINA TO GO TO PRIZE COURT

LONDON, Feb. 19.—The British government announced today that it had decided the cargo of the American steamer *Wilhelmina* should be held for the decision of the prize court.

The quantity of cargo passing through in January exceeded all previous months, although the vessels numbered on less than in December.
