

Transferrral of the government wireless station from Cape Blanco, awaits reply to a letter sent south several days ago by the Chamber of Commerce, addressed to Lieutenant R. F. McConnell, who was here a site at the Smith mill.

Three States in Zone

Oregon, Idaho and Washington are grouped in a northwestern zone, and this zone in turn is divided into 15 districts, Orders governing the zones or districts are issued from the Department of Agriculture.

Formation of zones are necessary, said Mr. Cattron, because various states, neighboring, could not agree to uniform game laws. Formerly a closed season in one state would mean an open season across the border in another, a fact that was little protection to the birds. .

Congress has removed this discreptancy, filling the gaps and put the migratory birds under uniform protection.



It further provides that teachers are to receive their full salary for the three holidays.

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
