Falls Between Decks.—While working on the Adeline in the lower bay on Tuesday night, Perry Cameron, seaman, fell into the hold and had three ribs broken and a compound fracture of the leg. He was attended by Dr. Lloyd Mott and will recover.

Machine by Express.—A new 1915 model of the 11 horsepower Harley-Davidson motorcycle was received today by The Gunner via the express route. The machine is electric lighted and has three speeds. It caused much comment on the street all day.

Mother Very Ill.—Mrs. Geo. N. Bolt received a telegram today stating that her mother, Mrs. Pomeroy, was critically ill again at Redwood City, Cal. Mrs. Bolt will probably leave on the next boat for the south. Mrs. Pomeroy suffered a stroke of paralysis sometime ago.
