Miss Dolan had mastered the thought of her selection, her intonation was good, and she gave the impression of reserve power which continued work will undoubtedly bring out. Miss Church gave a selection which was adapted to her size and stature and she gave the same with an ease and frankness which was pleasing. On a heavy selection she would probably have lacked force. Stone's strong point was "feeling," and enthusiasm. He made the audience feel that he believed every sentiment that he uttered. His freedom and apparent ease on the stage were undoubtedly in his favor. His articulation and intonation were only fair and can be improved by continued work. Walter rendered his selection with good tone color. His diction of words was commendable. As the program was going that night a little more voice and a little more fire would have been to his advantage.

Space forbids comment on the other speakers. The program did the class credit. The careful memorizing and correctness of pronunciation were noticeably good. Young speakers make the mistake often of not absorbing the thought of their selection. It ought to be well mastered and recalling words is entirely secondary and expression of thought is primary.
