## SIMPSON COMPANY MEETS MARCH 20

POSTPONED ANNUAL MEETING AT SAN FRANCISCO THEN WILL DECIDE IMPORTANT QUESTIONS FOR COOS BAY.

It is announced that the annual meeting of the Simpson Lumber Company has been postponed until March 20. Then it is expected it will be decided whether L. J. Simpson will have control of the Coos County holdings as his share of the estate. Other matters that will also be decided at that time will be the date of resumption of activities in the Porter mill, the possibility of taking over the box factory in conjunction with the mill and the donation of the Simpson Park in North Bend, to the city. Local parties have not received many advices concerning the developments in the affairs of the estate.

## REDONDO DEAL TO BE CLOSED SOON

Rumor That C. P. Doe May Put Yucatan Between Coos Bay and San Francisco

Although no official confirmation has been received here from San Francisco on the consumation of the pending sale of the Redondo by the C. A. Smith Company to the Alaska Coast Steamship company, a Guggenheim, subsidiary for \$100,000, indirect advices are that the final papers are to be signed up soon and the transfer will probably follow shortly.

## YUCATAN ON RUN

According to a report reaching here from San Francisco, arrangements between the C. A. Smith Company and C. P. Doe who operates the Yucatan between here and Portland, may be made whereby the Yucatan will be put on the Coos Bay-San Francisco run if the Redondo is taken off. The Yucatan is larger than any of the vessels running in here. She is 336 feet long, carries a crew of 72 men, has 2600 horsepower and about 5,000 tons, gross. She draws about nineteen feet of water when loaded, about the same as the Adeline Smith. She will carry about sixty passengers and a large lumber car-

go. She is now running between Portland, San Francisco, San Pedro and San Diego opposite the Roanoke. It is barely possible that the change, if made, may mean that the Elder may be replaced on the run between here and Portland for the time being by another of the Doe boats so that the Elder can take the Yucatan's place. The Alliance, now owned by Doe, is tied up at Portland.

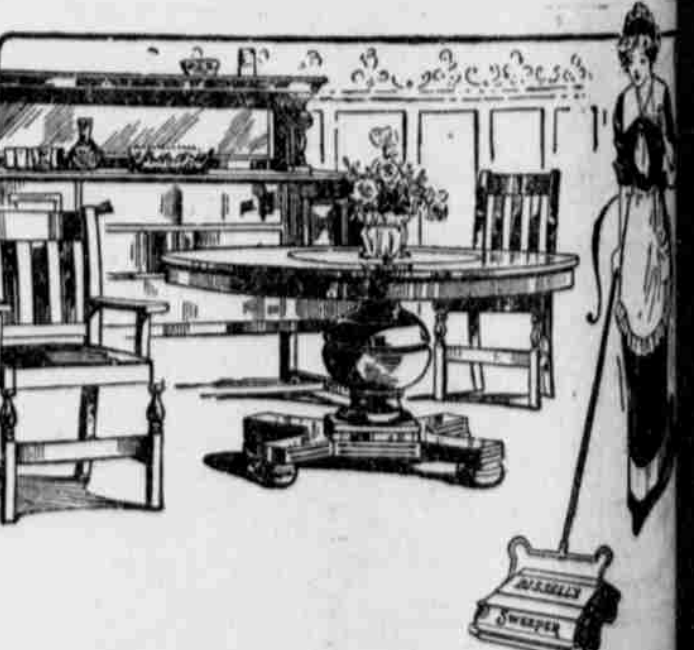
