### Brother Dies.

E. A. Anderson is in receipt of the sad news of the death of an elder brother, Henry Anderson, at Ditsburg, Alta., Canada, on February 16, in his 81st year. This is only the second death in a family of ten children of whom E. A. Anderson is the seventh child.

### Sells Business.

Sylvester Jones is over from Myrtle Point. He and Mr. Gourley have sold their meat market and wholesale meat business in Myrtle Point to J. A. Robbins. They have retained their ranch and stock business, but may dispose of that as they have a good offer for it.

### Was Too Wet.

### Receive Degrees.

Claud Richard Wright, government engineer at Bandon, and George I. Denbeigh were given the Royal Arch degree in Masonry last evening in the lodge rooms, following which the members enjoyed themselves at a banquet.

### Had Charts Aboard.

He bought out the Allen Billiard Parlors and expects the move will give him better accommodations.

### Opens Shop.

A. T. Lewis, who arrived here recently from Ellensburg, Washington, where he has been engaged in the contracting business, is opening a wall paper and paint business at 256 Market avenue. The firm will be known as the Art Decorating Company. He comes well recommended and will doubtless have a good business.

### Receives Black Hand Note.

A placard that dripped with blood, carried stains of dire deeds written in the form of a Black Hand carrying the warning "Beware," defender of Fire Bugs," appeared on the door of C. F. McKnight's office in the Coke Building. The attorney surveyed the work, admired the artistic temper displayed but refused to become excited, declaring that some of his friends are trifling with him.

### Repair Light plant.

Carpenters today are at work remodeling the auxiliary light plant of the Oregon Power Company at the Porter Mill, the station that was damaged by the fire of two months ago. According to R. M. Jennings, of the local company, the entire equipment will be restored and orders are now being placed for part of the material. The damage to the building was estimated by the fire insurance adjusters at about \$1100.

### To Hold Installation.

The members of the Sigma Chi fraternity who received their alumni charter a few days ago will meet in the rooms of Dr. Lloyd Mott, at North Bend, Saturday evening where the installation of officers will take place. At the same time plans will be discussed for the summer trip to the fraternity convention at San Francisco. The plan is to notify all Sigma Chi members of Oregon and Idaho and have them come to Coos Bay, that they may all leave from here together.

### Family Tree.

Frank Tichenor, who is here from Portland, has recently traced his family tree back to the early part of the seventeenth century. He finds that his ancestors, the Brinkerhoff, Hedden and Tichenor families, came to America soon after 1600 and some of his ancestors have fought in every American war. He has presented a copy of the genealogy to Mrs. Harry Nasburg, a cousin, whose family tree is about the same. Mr. Tichenor started in tracing it some time ago when he sought membership in the Sons of the American Revolution, which will hold its National convention at Portland next year.

### Has \$10,000,000 Scheme.

A blue print of proposed changes to the Coos Bay channel have been received by the Port Commissioners from M. M. Condron, of Walsey, Idaho. The sketch would build dikes on each side of a channel 2000 feet wide from the bar to the Smith mill. All fresh water, including Coos River, would flow outside of the main channel, emptying into the ocean through a cut to be made in the long sand spit running down to the bar. There would be

locks admitting boats from the Inlets to the north and from Coos River into the main channel. The plan will at least be presented at the meeting of the Commissioners next Monday.

### Steamboat Inspectors Here.

Government steamboat inspectors J. J. Meany and W. C. Weidlin arrived on the morning stage from Florence, and tomorrow will inspect the local steamboats, going on Friday to Coquille, planning their return to Portland Saturday on the Breakwater. At Gardiner they inspected the Restless; on Coos Bay they will look over the Powers, Alert, and the Roamer, and at Coquille, the Dispatch, Coquille and the Telegraph. These inspectors are assistants to local steamboat inspectors Edwards and Fuller and have no part in levying fines, but merely report to the main offices in Portland. Steamboats that are found complying with the law in all respects are granted licenses for another year.
