Young Mother Buried.—The funeral of Mrs. Henry Olson, of Bunker Hill, was held this morning from the family residence, the Rev. G. Le Roy Hall officiating. Many friends and all the members of the family gathered to pay their last respects to the young mother who was well known and liked. A baby girl about one year old is left and will be cared for by the deceased's parents.
Hopson Indicted.—Otho L. Hopson formerly of Marshfield, was one of those indicted at Portland for fraud in selling stock in the United States Cashier company. Hopson came here about eight years ago from Decatur, Ill., working on the newspapers here for a time, later was engaged in the real estate business at Bandon and was for a time selling stock for the United Wireless, prior to the exposure of that company as a fraud.

Want New School.—N. Busendorf, H. Powell, Capt. Britt and others were here yesterday en route to Coquille to urge the organization of a new school district on South Inlet. They plan to form the new one out of parts of Districts No. 61 and 57 and claim that by erecting a school house near the bridge, about thirty children, many of whom have to go three or four miles to the present schools, would be accommodated.

Is Passed Counterfeit.—A counterfeit dollar so badly worn that that little quicksilver was left on its face was handed to Officer Richardson this morning by a stranger who stated that the coin had been handed him with \$5 silver change in a saloon last evening. The bartender told the police that several such coins have been passed lately and that in the hurry of making change cannot be detected. The money was taken in charge by the officer and will either be destroyed or sent to the secret service men in Portland to add to their already big collection of Coos Bay money, that taken from the private mint started here some time ago.

New School District.—Carl C. Wilson, Wm. E. Homme and a delegation from Willanch Inlet went to Coquille yesterday and prevailed upon the County Court to create a new school district north of Cooston, which will be known as District No. 55. The consolidation of Cooston and Eastside automatically consolidated the school districts and made it easier for the residents of the North Cooston section to get the new district formed. The new district carries an assessed valuation of \$35,000 and contains about 20 children of school age. Mr. Wilson returned last evening bringing supplies and notices of election which will be called immediately.

PLANT ROSES IN MARSHFIELD NOW

MR. AND MRS. DREWS ARRANGE TO SELL BUSHES THAT WILL BLOOM THIS SEASON AT LOW PRICE FOR CLEAN-UP SEASON

Plant roses. This is the season and Clean-up Day is the most appropriate occasion. In accordance with the spirit of the movement, the Drews Greenhouse and Floral Supply House have arranged to supply rose bushes to all at practically cost, Friday and Saturday. They are co-operating with the municipal and Chamber of Commerce committees to make the occasion a big success and an epoch making one in the history of Marshfield.

Mr. and Mrs. Drews have secured a supply of about 1500 rose bushes for the occasion. These represent about fifty of the finest varieties and will be sold at from 15 to 20 cents apiece Friday and Saturday.

Best Varieties Here. Among the varieties they have in stock are the J. B. Clark, the Dixon, the Testout, the famous Pink Watson, the McArthur, the Jacqueminot, the Kaiserine, the Breunner, the Ramona and many others.

All of these bushes will bud this season and produce well. The bushes are from two to three years old and were secured from California as Mr. and Mrs. Drews have found that the California bushes are best adapted to Coos Bay climate. The Portland roses, or most of them, do not withstand the fogs well.

Fancy Shrubbery. Besides the fine assortment of roses, Mr. and Mrs. Drews have a fine assortment of fancy shrubbery, including some from Japan and some from Belgium.

They also have a fine lot of potted plants and flowers which can be readily transplanted.

Their greenhouse and grounds in First Addition have been converted into a bower of beauty. They have some American Beauty and Watson pink roses in the greenhouse which will shortly be in bloom. They have a fine lot of carnations, sweet peas and other flowers in bloom, but have not been able to supply the demand from their own greenhouse and weekly ship in about 200 carnations from San Francisco.

Show Right Spirit. Make it a point of the "Marshfield Clean-up Day" to plant a rose. Mr. and Mrs. Drews in order to add to the beauties of Marshfield have fixed the special price for Friday and Saturday at 15 and 20 cents for bushes that will bloom this season. This is practically what the bushes cost them, but for the special occasion, profits will be forgotten and the true community spirit will be exemplified.

Anyway, visit the greenhouse and ground in First Addition and if you

care for something besides roses to beautify your home, they will supply it for you.
However, plant at least one rose bush near your home and co-operate with those who are trying to make Marshfield a place of beauty.
