WILL FILL SPRING TO STOP TYPHOID

DR. WALTER CULIN, COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER, CONDEMNNS WATER SUPPLY NEAR TAR HEEL—BUNKER HILL CASES.

Dr. Walter Culin, County Health Officer, came over yesterday from Coquille and investigated the causes of the recent deaths from typhoid fever on the Bay.

He announced that he would immediately order the spring on the Evans place, below Tar Heel, filled up and would also take steps to purify the Bunker Hill systems.

At the Evans place, which is now owned by L. J. Simpson, he found that a spring was the source of water supply. A short distance above the spring is a cess pool which drains into it. He said that about a year ago, a couple of cases of typhoid were directly attributed to it. The typhoid in the Bickford family, which has caused the death of two children already, was also directly attributable to it. Now there is no one on the place, but he will not allow any delay in filling the spring. He said that in addition to the cases directly due to it, the place was a menace as a typhoid carrier might become infected from it and thus scatter germs.

Bunker Hill Cases.

He did not have an opportunity to fully investigate the Bunker Hill cases. The death of Mrs. Henry Olson, a well-known woman of that section, occurred this week, from typhoid and Mrs. H. M. Albee is just recovering from a severe illness.

It seems that at Bunker Hill a number of springs are utilized as the sources of supply. The Olson home and five others are supplied from one of these.

None of the cases can be attributed to anything except the private sources of water supply, although Mrs. Albee's illness is believed to be attributable to something else.

STEAMSHIP ARRIVES IN EARLY AFTER PLEASANT VOYAGE—LEAVES FOR PORTLAND ON SATURDAY AT 1 P. M.

With 35 passengers the Breakwater arrived in this morning from Portland after experiencing a pleasant trip down from the north. She brought a fair cargo of freight and expects to leave out again for Portland on Saturday at 1 p. m.

STEAM SCHOONER CHARTERED FOR ONE TRIP—CARRY LUMBER AND PASSENGERS FOR SAN FRANCISCO.

The Redondo will not return to Coos Bay. Such is the report of the agents, the sale to the Alaska Steamship Company having been practically completed. In her place will come the steam schooner Carlos, of San Francisco, a boat of the Olsen & Mahoney line, chartered by the Smith Lumber Company for this one trip. She will leave out on Saturday for the south taking passengers with her. Whether she will be on the run regularly or whether she will be purchased by the company in place of the Redondo is purely a guesswork matter, no other information having been given out.

Once before the Carlos has been in here. Several years ago she came from the South bringing 900,000 brick and building supplies for the Coke building.

She is larger than the Redondo, having a gross tonnage of 865 compared with the 679 tons of the Redondo. Her length is 198.4 feet with a width of 39.2 feet, and taking 14.8 feet of water. She has quarters for 24 passengers.

Nann to be Overhauled.

The Nann Smith will not return here this week, as had been expected, but will have her annual inspection going into dry dock where her bottom will be scraped and painted anew. She will leave San Francisco for Coos Bay next Tuesday and thereafter will maintain her weekly schedule, according to the agents, sailing from here every Saturday.

Two teams, Marshfield and Bandon, are now tied for the championship with .666 per cent. Both have still two games to play. According to Coach Niles, to win the contest of Friday will mean a fair grip on the pennant trophy for North Bend, he says, has stayed at the bottom of the list through the season.

What the outcome will be when Bandon and North Bend meet tomorrow evening is not a matter to bet on with your eyes shut. Both these teams play a similar game and in the last struggle, staged on the dance hall floor in the City-by-the-Sea the North Benders followed close under the mantle of victory, being edged out in the last minute by a 19 to 20 score. This team now feels confident that on their own floor they will be able to retrieve their losses.

With Marshfield and Bandon both holding .666 per cent, Coquille ranks third on the list, with .571 per cent. This is not taken to mean she has no part in the running. "Far be it from such," declaim the Dopsters reckoning thusly: "If Marshfield loses one of its two games left to play and if Bandon does the same thing and if Coquille wins the one game she has left on her schedule, then this will leave the three teams tied all the way round, with .666 per cent."
