

PENTLAND COMES AS MARRIED MAN

CHIEF WITNESS IN MYRTLE POINT CASE A BENEDICT—TO STAND BY HIS WRITTEN STATEMENTS.

William Pentland, charged with lewd cohabitation that he might be extradited from another state, chief witness in the Russell case at Myrtle Point, arrived here yesterday on the stage from Coeur d'Alene in custody of Deputy Sheriff W. C. Laird.

That Pentland is a married man with two children is a new angle to the case and one unknown even to Mr. Laird before he reached Coeur d'Alene. The accused came to Myrtle Point from Idaho and worked on the Russell ranch, but said very little about a family.

HAYNES INLET IN NEED OF DREDGING

DELEGATION OF FARMERS BEFORE PORT COMMISSIONERS—SAY BOATS ARE STRANDED AT LOW TIDES.

Again petitioning the dredging of Haynes Inlet, declaring that at low water their boats of produce are stranded, a delegation of four men appeared before the Port Commissioners this morning.

Practically the entire afternoon was spent by the Commissioners in going over, with J. T. Brand, the assessments for fills in south Marshfield. Mr. Brand made his first report, taking up each individual case, showing whether the property owners have paid or whether they have not and their reasons.

A contract for dredging the Coquille river in the 26 mile stretch from Coquille to Bandon was signed by the commissioners at a meeting of the Port of Coquille on Saturday. This work is to be done by the dredge Seattle, of the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredging Company, and has been sent to Seattle for signing by the president of the concern.

LOCALS DEFEAT BANDON FIVE—HAVE HIGHEST PERCENTAGE IN COUNTY LEAGUE AND ONE GAME LEFT TO PLAY.

In a game marked more by efforts at guarding than in basket shooting, the Marshfield five Saturday night defeated the quintet from visitors securing only two free throws from the field, annexing the second four from the foul line. By her victory Marshfield placed herself at the head of the county league with a percentage of .714.
