FOR A CITY BEAUTIFUL

THE city clean-up campaign last week accomplished some good, but seemed to lack cohesion and system to achieve the greatest efficiency. Any public movement of such a character requires thorough organization and systematic effort. There never was a better time to produce the best results, for a campaign for beautifying Marshfield than the present and the first step toward a beautiful city is to make a clean city.

What Marshfield requires is a good housekeeper just now who will give it a thorough old-fashioned spring housecleaning. One day or one week is not sufficient. Any good housekeeper will tell you that. The city beautiful campaign which includes clean-up, flower planting, etc., is essentially women's work, and it will take women's work to make it a success. Men are ready enough to talk city betterment, but with too many of them talk is the end of it. Some men will get out of their own accord in the Spring and set out flowers, and shrubs, and roses, and improve the lawn and haul away the trash, but most of them only do it under compulsion by the women of the family.

Why should the women's clubs not unite in one large federated club for civic work and co-operate with the men in making a city beautiful? If the women's organizations become sufficiently interested in a more beautiful city, something will be accomplished. If anything is to be done team work will be necessary. A few handsome lawns, rose bushes and parkings on a street will attract a little attention, but not as much as if all were well kept. Separate organizations taking in each street in the city might well be formed, each with its executive staff and its committee. These organizations might then compete with each other to see which could accomplish the most pleasing result.

There is nowhere in the world a place where more beautiful lawns and parkings may be made with less effort than on Coos Bay. The Oregon rose is unequalled and it grows to perfection here without nursing and blooms with very little care. Roses in profusion cannot fail to impress anyone who sees them, and there are hundreds of other flowers, hyacinths, daffodils, dahlias, etc., that are almost equally beautiful and thrive as well.

Beautifying the city of Marshfield is more timely this year than ever before, for there are certain to be many visitors to see and admire. Industrial progress may be aided, for Marshfield is seeking to attract the kind of people who are impressed with beautiful surroundings. But, this is not the only consideration—a well planned and well-executed campaign whose purpose is to make Marshfield the prettiest and most attractive city in Oregon would be well worth in itself all the effort that would be involved. Attractive surroundings serve not only to impress the visitors, but to make more pleasant the daily life of the home people.
