Very Ill.—Dr. Ira B. Bartle of North Bend was here Tuesday night. Mrs. Bartle has been at the home of her grandmother, Mrs. Betty, at Fairview for several days. Mrs. Betty has been critically ill and owing to her advanced age, there is little hope of her recovery.

Gets Ties.—E. L. Robinson has returned from Sunset Bay where he has been working on the construction of some new roads which L. J. Simpson is opening to get out railroad ties and piling which have been cut. Many thousands of ties have been cut and are ready to get out as soon as roads are opened to the different tie camps.

Canned Salmon Day.—Tomorrow is the third national Canned Salmon Day. Definite instructions have been given the populace that they are not to eat the fish raw, boiled or fried tomorrow—they must be canned. And by eating of this product, so it is said, impetus is given the industry that has long ago made the Northwest famous. Even President Woodrow Wilson will eat canned salmon tomorrow, a shipment having been sent east to him some time ago.

Insurance Not Given.—E. R. Thompson, insurance adjuster, returned to Portland this morning without making a payment in the claim of Charles Skerrett for insurance on property, books and personal effects, lost in the Bunker Hill fire. It is said that Mr. Thompson expects to make a thorough examination and it is probable Mr. Skerrett will file a claim for the insurance. He is expecting to leave and has been waiting for the damage to be adjusted.

Suing for Money.—A spirited legal fight took place in Justice Pennock's court this morning and afternoon. Attorney Dwight T. Hodge, acting on behalf of August Hendrickson, administrator of the estate of Ed. Koskela, who was killed at the Smit's Mill, sought to prove that Otto Richer owed the estate \$41, this having been borrowed from Koskela it is alleged. W. A. Ackerman, representing Richer contended that Richer borrowed no money and that he had no dealings with the deceased. Judge Pennock took the matter under advisement.

Accuses Both.—Chas. Gram, a deputy factory inspector, has sworn out warrants in Justice Stanley's court at Coquille against Wm. Ingersoll and Fred Muetzel of Ten Mile for violations of the state law. There is a legal clash between Muetzel and Ingersoll as to who is proprietor of the mill and consequently Gram has warrants issued for both. A defective boiler in the mill exploded last summer, killing two men and their donkey engine is in bad shape and the state inspectors notified them recently to repair it and they have not complied. Ingersoll could not be found today to be served and Muetzel is expected back tomorrow from Camas.
