DESPITE fads that run to black patches or other "beauty" schemes that are described as mere tricks of the trade, the groundwork of feminine beauty, as indicated by the demands placed upon beauty doctors by maids and matrons, is the same as it always has been. Its fundamentals are a fair, clear skin, bright eyes and good teeth, says specialists in the art of making women attractive.

The striking modern developments which tend toward a higher art and therefore toward nature itself, are two. The first is an awakened sense of the fitness of a woman's charms to her age, says an exchange. The second is an appreciation of the fact that attractiveness is as much a matter of hair dressing, clothing, speech and carriage as of a pretty face alone.

There are fewer calls these days to reconstruct an attractive woman of 50 into a simpering gazelle of 16, say beauty experts. It is realized by the sophisticated American woman that beauty exists in all stages of life, and that the greater allure is founded not upon a semblance of youth, but upon a skillful development of the charms that are appropriate to the "patient's age."

The modern beauty doctor, therefore, is more than a smearer of cosmetics and a rubber of wrinkles. It is necessary to take mental command of the subject and to work out harmonious ideas that include everything from neat shoes to a becoming style of wearing the hair. In a way, the expert is like the efficiency engineer who is assigned to revise the methods of a commercial establishment in the interests of efficiency. The expert must take the suppliant for beauty as a whole, not just as a face, and "reorganize" her. In this case, too, efficiency is the aim. It is measured by the degree of "pull" exerted by the finished product upon masculine admiration, according to the beauty doctors.

For, notwithstanding denials, masculine appreciation, after all, is the only gauge of success that is available for measuring feminine beauty, it is pointed out.
