
NEW DESTINATION

A beautiful floral square of moss outlined with tiny ferns a large "C" for Chaminade in the center, made of red quill daisies, the moss covered with wonderfully fragrant double English violets, was presented by the Club to the president, Mrs. Stauff in appreciation of her untiring efforts in the management of the business, sometimes so arduous.

The new case for the club's music was in place, a fine piece of workmanship, the native wood being of especially beautiful grain and the dull finish gives it a very rich appearance.

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WATER WASTE

Little drops of water dripping from many faucets and leaky fixtures makes a flood of waste. New washers are easily placed in faucets and does not require a plumber if there is a valve to shut off all the water from the house as there should be in every case. A new washer costs about nothing but if a leak is allowed to continue long, the valve seat may be cut and an entire new faucet required.

A faucet leaking to the extent of only separate drops of water will waste 16 gallons per day and 5840 gallons per year. A hole 1-32 inch in diameter is so small that an ordinary pin will nearly fill it, yet in one day 528 gallons or in one year 191,760 gallons of water will be wasted, which is as much as 3 or 4 families will use in the same time. Multiply the waste from one faucet by several hundred and the figures are enormous that it is easily understood why water systems all over the country are trying to educate the public in preventing waste.

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
