Coos Bay by W. G. Scammell, is again in trouble. She was wrecked once at Peacock Spit in the Columbia and had a number of narrow escapes and was finally tied up. While at Eureka this week fire broke out in the engine room, and for four hours threatened to destroy the craft. The amount of damage is not known.

Retrains Here.—Dick Miller, of Miller, who was taken to California to answer a charge of non support of his wife by a former marriage, returned on the Nann Smith and will resume his position as brakeman on the Smith-Powers trains. A telegram stating that he could have his old position here if he returned resulted in the Judge granting him clemency. Conductor Albert Abbott sent the telegram.

To Quiet Title.—Constable Cox this morning served a summons on Mr. and Mrs. Frank E. Peterson, of Eastside, and Ed Peterson, a brother, to appear in a suit to be brought in the circuit court by Julius and Augusta Nelson to show why they lay claim to certain marsh lands on Haynes Inlet which the latter claim as their own. The complaint states that the Petersons acquired the title through fraud.

New Fire Escape.—Not waiting for new ordinances requiring more fire escapes on buildings Harry McKewen, of the Chandler Hotel, has had a ladder made which reaches from the roof above the first floor in the rear of the building to a ground. This would allow a hurry up egress of lodgers from the first and third floors without needing the side of the building.

Must Pay Money.—Judge Pennek this morning decided in favor of the plaintiff in the case of August Hendrickson vs Otto Richer meaning that the latter must pay \$41.50 which it is claimed he borrowed from Ed Koskela before his death. Richer claims that he did not owe the money, never having borrowed it. Note books were introduced to show the claim. It is said that now Mrs. Richer will sue for \$50.75, due, she says, for board while Koskela stayed at their home.
