Mandamus Filed.—Stoll and Hodge today filed a mandamus before Judge Coke to compel the Port and city to come into court on Wednesday morning and show cause why a writ of mandamus should not be issued forcing them to pay the judgment of about \$1800 awarded clients of the two attorneys at the last session of the circuit court for damages alleged to be caused by the Mill slough fill in west Marshfield.

FRANK LINDGREN ON BAY 57 YEARS

Hale and Hearty Despite 83 Years—Mrs. O. Hansen an Old Resident.

Frank Lindgren, one of Coos Bay's oldest pioneers, recently said that he antedated both Anderson Wright and C. C. Pratt, two old residents, mention of whom were made in The Times. Mr. Lindgren recently celebrated his eighty-third birthday, and is still hale and hearty, being able to read without glasses. He has been a resident of Coos Bay about fifty-seven years. He made a trip back to his old home in Finland about forty-seven years ago to bring his wife and his brother to Coos Bay, but with this exception, most of his years have been spent here. Mrs. O. Hansen, of North Marshfield, is another Coos Bay pioneer, having been a resident of this section since 1853 when her family brought her to Coos Bay from Missouri, where she was born about ten months previously.
