J. A. WARD WRITES OF SAN FRANCISCO EXHIBIT

Says They Need Masons' Myrtle Wood Arch—Have no Literature to Supply Demand.

J. A. Ward, who is looking after the Coos and Curry exhibit at the San Francisco exposition writes as follows:

"I wish to emphasize the importance of having the Royal Arch, which the Coos Bay Masons are having constructed, sent promptly. Mr. Wernich, who is here, tells me that on his return he will have it sent down, but he wants to superintend the packing and shipping of it himself. The arch is being turned out of myrtle wood and is highly polished. We have a splendid place ready for it, and it would simply cap the climax of our myrtle wood exhibit. That, together with the coal fireplace and the landscape and game exhibit upstairs seems to be making a hit. The attendant at the Oregon building told me that they were receiving more calls for Coos Bay literature than for any other portion of the state. Right here let me emphasize the necessity of our people getting plenty of literature here just as quickly as possible. I have only half a dozen booklets left and am holding them back."

"We are sadly in need of a good map showing the Coos and Curry district."

He states there are thousands of visitors anxious for information. He will be advised that booklets are soon to be printed, 300,000 of them, to be sent south.
