Redmen to Build.—At a meeting of the Marshfield Lodge of Redmen last night, a proposition for the lodge to buy a site and build a hall, was proposed. Nothing definite was done except to make it a special order of business for the next meeting.

Was Drunk.—R. Braumbaugh, who has been working in the McDonald & Vaughn camps, appeared before Police Judge Butler this morning after a night in jail and pleaded guilty of being drunk in a front street rooming house. He was fined \$5, this to be paid at a later date.

Greek Jumps Board Bill.—X. Remitos is being searched for today by the police for jumping a \$25 board bill at the home of Mrs. May Taylor in North Bend. His baggage at the depot was watched and a man was stationed at the Elder to see that he did not sail south. A warrant has been issued for his arrest.

Voluntary Bankruptcy.—The hearing of the creditors in the voluntary bankruptcy of William H. Schroder, jeweler of Coquille, has been set for March 23 in the office of C. A. Schibred. The assets are listed at \$1,726 and the liabilities at \$3,461. None of the creditors are local men.

St. Patrick's Day.—Tomorrow is St. Patrick's day and quite a few Coos Bay people will be able to use the real shamrock in their decorations. A few years ago, the Rev. Father Donnelly during a visit to the Emerald Isle sent some turf from Ireland here and it thrived when replanted, shamrock and all.

Dredge Work in April.—It is now believed that the Dredge Seattle will not finish its contract on Coos Bay prior to April 15. Owing to the re-hearing being granted in the Port of Coos Bay case, there is some question as to whether the dredge will be able to go direct from here to the Coquille.

Lie Lien.—Sheriff Johnson while here Saturday served a lien on the Flanagan Estate in behalf of the Twin City Lumber company for lumber furnished for improvements in the Ideal Cafe when it was remodelled last year, prior to the time the present proprietors Arhos, Anest and Arhos, took possession.

Survey Inlets.—County Surveyor McCulloch and Assistant Surveyor J. F. Polley, came over from Coquille yesterday to do some work on some of the inlets here which the county court is figuring on improving. C. H. Coddling will assist in the work, which will have to be done at the low stages of the tide.

Channel Bothers.—Parties from North Inlet complain that the new channel recently dredged there is in

bad condition. They claim that it is not nearly as good as the old tortuous channel. It required over two hours for one boat to navigate it last Saturday. The port commission had it dredged with a view to making it navigable at odd stages of the tide.

Eject Teachers in April.—Judge Hall, clerk of the school board, states that the teachers for next year in the public schools will be elected at a meeting of the board to be held in April. It is probable that recommendations will be made by City Superintendent Tiedgen and action will be then taken by the board in making up the teaching staff for 1915-1916.

Robbers Steal Tobacco.—Thieves broke through the rear door of A. W. Kelley's cigar and confectionary store at Coquille night before last, said W. J. Mitchell who was over this morning. No money was taken but about \$20 in cigars and cigarettes are reported missing. Entrance was gained by breaking in the glass door at the rear to turn the lock.

Has New Line.—Milton Glass of San Francisco, who has been making the Coos Bay territory for a number of years, is back on the Bay with a new line. He has purchased an interest in the Judell Tobacco company and is dispensing pure havanas. He gained renown here as the "Human brass band" and his nephew has gained fame as the author of the "Potash and Perlmutter" stories.

Confer With Morrow.—Captain MacGinn says that Major J. J. Morrow is expected to return to Portland about April 1 and he plans to immediately confer with him about the Coos Bay entrance improvement. Major Morrow will be among the officials to be advanced in the ranks following the elevation of Colonel Goethals and other members of the United States Engineers in Panama.

To Blast Rock.—Engineer Donald M. Charleson, of the Commission is arranging to begin work on the sandstone reef near the government works in the lower bay. The ledge is narrow and it is one of the narrowest points in the bay. He figures the work can be easily done as soon as good weather sets in which eliminate the delay caused by winds and choppy water in the lower bay.

To Build Home.—Guy Chambers and wife came in last evening from Daniels Creek where they moved about two months ago onto their dairy farm. Chambers declares there is nothing like the out door life and exhibits a pair of calloused hands to prove he has been working. At present he is securing plans for a modern home to build on his ranch. He and his wife expect to remain here for several days.

Southern Pacific Meeting.—At the annual meeting of the Southern Pacific, which is to be held in Anchorage, Jefferson County, Kentucky, April 7, it is expected that the formal absorption of the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern, the Willamette Pacific and the steamship Breakwater will be voted. The company now owns the stock of the subsidiary companies. Fifteen directors are also to be chosen.

Quits Bull Moose.—Capt. T. J. Meegeon has handed in his resignation as committeeman of the Bull Moose party for Coos County. He states in his resignation that he strayed from the Bull Moose fold when Hanley was nominated for Senator and that he expects to support L. J. Simpson as the Republican candidate for Congress from this district next year, he cannot consistently remain an official of the Progressives.

Buys Bandon Stock.—R. A. Copple, of the Golden Rule, was the successful bidder for the stock of the Bandon Dry Goods company, bankrupt. His bid of \$1,721.75 was the highest of six; the lowest, which was about \$600, offered by a Coquille firm. The sale was confirmed today by C. A. Schibred, referee in bankruptcy. Liabilities of the firm, which belonged to Murphy and Westergren were about \$12,000, according to Mr. Schibred, and the stock inventoried at \$3,817. The sale also includes fixtures valued at about \$721.

Honor Mrs. Farrin.—Mrs. E. L. C. Farrin, D. L. Rood's daughter, has received the appointment of Chief Supervisor of the Cashier's Department, at the exposition at San Francisco, having the supervision of the ten supervisors who are over the 300 cashier girls employed.

Here to Visit.—Mrs. Vernon A. Smith returned last evening on the Adeline Smith from Oakland. She was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Thomas H. Drew of Minneapolis and her cousin, Miss Margaret

Drew, of St. Louis, who will spend some time on the Bay. Mr. Smith is in Oakland.

Owens Central Avenue Land.—W. R. McGeorge, who came in from Eugene last evening is interested in the Commercial Bank of Eugene and last year bought from William Grimes a 100-foot frontage on Central avenue east of the Myrtle Arms. J. D. S. Wade, also of Eugene, is a prominent business man there. They are on the Bay for a few days.

Unite School Districts.—A meeting will be held at the Esterbeck district school house tonight for the purpose of aiding the consolidation of the Esterbeck and Catching Inlet district schools. Some time ago it was proposed to unite them with the Coos River Consolidated District, but others favor the union of the Catching Inlet districts separately. Supervisor Golden and Raymond E. Baker of Coquille, left today to attend the meeting.

Got a Coon.—Mrs. W. G. Simpson, of Haynes Inlet, proved her prowess with a revolver the other day when she shot and killed a coon with a revolver at a distance of fifty yards. The Simpson poultry yard has been suffering deprivations recently from some midnight marauder and while the owners were speculating on what was causing the loss of chickens, Mr. Coon got hungry and came down in daylight for an afternoon luncheon. The dogs saw him and raised an alarm and Mrs. Simpson getting a revolver gave chase and soon had the scalp of the coon bringing him down with the first shot.

Kruse's Project.—Archie Kruse who disposed of his shingle mill at Prosper some time ago has purchased the machinery and plant of the defunct box factory of the Coquille River Manufacturing Company from the parties who bid it in at the sheriff's sale. He is dickering with the Bandon Commercial Club for a free site for the factory there and may arrange to get the spruce required from the Geo. W. Moore mill. He is said to have also been negotiating with the mills on the Bay on a contract for spruce lumber. He has boxed up the machinery and removed it from the old plant preliminary to moving it to the new location which remains to be selected.
