**Annual Report Complete.**—The annual report of the Port of Coos Bay has been completed by Sec. J. W. Motley and is now ready for publication. On January 1, 1914 there was on hand cash amounting to \$253,969.48 and through the year receipts were added to this amount making the total for the year, \$515,543.31 and the disbursements amounted to \$479,128.40. The cash on hand at the beginning of the year amounted to \$38,812.26.

**Wed in Portland.**—Charles Harlocker, oldest son of Judge and Mrs. Harlocker, of Coquille, was married in Portland, on Tuesday to Miss Sarah Eliza Pattinson, of Portland. The newlyweds will arrive here tomorrow on the Breakwater. Mr. Harlocker is a graduate pharmacist and will take a position in the C. J. Fuhrman drug store at Coquille. The groom is a brother to Frank Harlocker of this city. Coquille friends are planning a warm reception for the young couple.

**Dispute Ownership.**—An injunction is being sought in the equity court by Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Pierson of Myrtle Point who seek to keep W. B. Myers, representative of the Estabrook company from cutting any more timber on their land near Myrtle Point. Pierson, who owns a 120 acre tract, claims that the timber does not belong to the Estabrook company and that they have no right to touch his trees. The case will be brought up Monday in the equity court before Judge Cole.

**One Down False Alarms.**—As a means of cutting down the false alarms that last year cost the city between \$200 and \$300 the chief of police has issued his order for the annual cleaning of chimneys. Soot that has gathered there in a 12 month must vanish he says. No more clogging of flues and the sounding of alarms that bring out the entire fire department at the rate of \$1 per man for each call. There is a penalty for not obeying this edict and this, the officers say, will be enforced.

**Inquiry From Switzerland.**—An inquiry from St. Gall, Switzerland, was received at the Chamber of Commerce this morning asking for information regarding Coos Bay. H. Tanner, who writes the letter, states that he saw the advertisement in the Sunset magazine. The last add of Coos Bay ran in this publication last June. Also a letter was received by Mr. Motley from John M. Scott, general passenger agent in Oregon for the S. P., asking for booklets for his Portland office saying inquiries are received there daily.

**One Day Institute.**—On March 26 there will be a one day institute of the teachers of the Coos Bay section of the county according to the announcement today of F. A. Tiedgen, superintendent of schools. Dr. D. H. Sheldon, Dean of the Department of Education at the University of Oregon will be present. He will spend a week in Coos County, beginning March 23. An invitation has been extended to all teachers and Superintendent Baker asks that teachers take advantage of the institute. Three sessions will be held on Friday during which will be sandwiched in discussions on vital subjects by various speakers. At noon the domestic science department of the local high school will serve a 15 cent luncheon.

**Basket Ball Tonight.**—The last game of the season for Marshfield high school will be played this evening in North Bend. This is the game that was scheduled for Wednesday evening and called off late that afternoon. Much interest centers around this contest for, should the locals win, they will have earned the championship of the county. To lose will mean a tie in percentage with Myrtle Point. The Bandon high school on Saturday defeated the two teams of Riverton, the first team winning 21 to 17 and the second five, 21 to 15. Both games were fast and clean throughout. The trip up from Bandon was made on the boat Sunset, the Charm having been injured in its collision with the Telegraph that afternoon.

**To Repair Boilers.**—C. H. Gram, deputy Labor Commissioner, returned this morning from Ten Mile where he has been for two days looking over the saw mill formerly operated by William Ingersoll and which was condemned for faulty boilers. The plant is now shut down and in charge of Otto Mitchell, son of the owner. Boiler connections were destroyed making it impossible to use the machinery until repairs have been made on the boiler of the mill. It is expected this will be done within a couple of days, though Mr. Gram states the donkey engine must be

completely overhauled before being ready for use. He will appoint someone from here to inspect the work when it is completed. Mr. Gram leaves down the coast for Crescent City within a day or two.
