DROWNED AT BAXDON.

James Osborne Drowns and Two Have Narrow Escape.

A Bandon paper says: James Osborne, son of Mrs. F. L. Christie of Bandon Heights, who would have reached his eighteenth year July 17, lost his life in the breakers of Table Rock about six o'clock Tuesday and his partners, Bill and Jim Winegar, closely escaped the same fate when the 19-foot fish boat containing the three was turned over by a huge comb.

Both of the Winegar boys escaped by a hair, the hair upon which is suspended every deep-sea fisherman. Jim receiving a painful scalp wound by being hit by the boat or some of its equipment, while young Osborne was drowned, probably after having been knocked senseless.
