The contest was to have been staged last week, then was set for this coming Saturday and later put off a third time.

Carlos Sails South.—Late yesterday afternoon the steam schooner Carlos left the Smith Terminal dock for San Pedro carrying a cargo of lumber and seven passengers. They were J. F. Telander, D. O. Becker, L. Polletti, Harry Hunt, R. Chisholm, Martin Burns and William Goldwart. The Carlos came in Sunday morning and is expected to return here from the South, being chartered for each trip.

Hold Star Chamber Session.—Judge Watson this morning stated that the hearing of the Coquille river boatmen before Inspectors Edwards and Fuller was being held yesterday and today behind closed doors, no one being admitted to the grand jury room in which the session was held, except the witnesses and those directly connected with the affair between the Telegraph and the Laarm.

Right-of-Way Deed is Filed.—The deed from the Johnson-Anderson Co. to the Willamette - Pacific Railroad Company, transferring to the latter the right-of-way through the marshy on the Sluslaw river, was filed for record yesterday. The consideration as named in the deed is \$9000. The Johnson-Anderson company reserves the right to remove rock from the premises conveyed to the railroad company.—Eugene Register.

Refused Freedom.—An attempt of J. E. Millard, through his attorneys, to file a motion to confess judgment of \$111 alleged to be owing the Schroeder and Hildebrand Company, was thwarted today, the plaintiffs and their attorneys refusing to allow the action. The written consent of the plaintiff is necessary before a judgment can be entered and the defendant freed of the charge, according to the law. Millard is held under bonds for \$111.

College Warblers Coming.—Ben Fisher received a letter today from the University of Oregon stating the quartette of the Glee Club will leave Eugene during the spring vacation of April 10 to 18, which time they will fill in engagements on Coos Bay. From this it is taken that the original plans calling for the visit of the entire glee club have been changed because of the heavy expense of bringing 25 men here. There will be several engagements for the quartette in this vicinity.

Judge Has Narrow Escape.—Judge Butler nearly fell from the "Chinaman's tree" when this morning Nels Thorp, arrested two weeks ago on a charge of being drunk and fined \$5 which he was unable to pay, returned with the money and handed a check over the bar of justice. Having recovered his wife the Judge boomed and carefully hid the gold piece in the city treasury. Ed Brooks, this morning answered a charge of drunkenness and escaped with a five-dollar fine. Car No. 9527, said to belong to Fred Hollister, of North Bend, was reported on Second and Central streets last evening shortly after eight o'clock without a light.

Jury Disagrees.—The jury summoned yesterday in the case of Miller vs. Miller in Judge Shuster's court at North Bend were dismissed without giving a decision, having disagreed. District Attorney Liljeqvist was called last evening, but stated he must leave for Salem and that the case will have to wait. Judge Shuster stated it probably will be dropped. Andrew Miller arrested Charles Miller for trespass, alleging that he crossed property at South Inlet on which he had been forbidden, this property having been leased from the Bennett Trust Company. Charles Miller wanted the right of way from two lots the other side of the forbidden land to the county road and was arrested when he defied the lessee. The latter claimed that going over the land where he was taking out ties spoiled the place he had fixed for unloading ties.
