

TWO PARTS LOTS OF LAWYERS

OREGON FIFTH IN STATES OF UNION IN NUMBER OF LAWYERS

Marshfield Has Legal Advice For Every 176 Persons, a Record Among Cities of The Coast

Oregon ranks fifth among the states of the union in its number of lawyers, according to The District, just arrived here and figuring from the number of attorneys in this city, there is one legal adviser for about 176 persons, a record among the cities of the coast.

The District of Columbia, though not a state, ranks first with its number of lawyers. To attend to the troubles of the people of Washington, D. C. there is one lawyer to every 218 persons. Perhaps it is the fact that there is one lawyer in Nevada that puts that state at the head of the list with one lawyer for every 204 persons in the state. Washington is second with the ratio of one to 460. Colorado, 1 to 485. California, one to 488 and Oregon fifth with one legal adviser to every 531 persons.

In this state there are, including judges, 7,704 attorneys and all the numbers are in hand the day of 29 years. There are 30 more attorneys on the Oregon list.

He said that the crew escaped in one of the merchantmen they had captured and most of them managed to make their way back to Germany. GRASS EARLY FEED

DAIRYMEN FALLING LOW ON FEED AIDED BY SPRING

J. L. Smith, County Agriculturist, Warns Members Against Turning Coos Into Boggy Pastures—Kall Grass.

Throughout over the county who have not been saved by the coming of the spring grass, according to J. L. Smith, County Agriculturist, who came over from Coquille this morning, Mr. Smith is bobbling on coquilles, having seriously injured his right knee a week ago while traveling on horseback on the north fork of the Coquille River.

Caution as to turning stock into the pastures while they are still boggy and wet is voiced by the agriculturist. Such procedure, he says, will later prove a drawback to the land in question, as the cattle stamp out the grass and also tramp the ground so that in future plowing the clods break in great chunks and refuse to break for proper tillage.

Coos County, he says, is several weeks ahead of the Willamette Valley in the production of its early grass crop, a most important factor considered from the dairyman's standpoint.

Practically 20 herds have been signed up for the new cow-testing association on the north fork of the Coquille, reports Mr. Smith. It was while working toward the finish of this association that the became disabled. Riding on horseback, he turned out for a hole in the road and hit his head against a heavy snag that struck him in the knee. His right leg was paralyzed for the time and in this condition he rode 15 miles to a doctor.

With the association in the valley working, Mr. Smith expects to come here and turn his efforts toward the forming of an association in the Ten Mile country. Many of the dairymen there have shown themselves to be interested and enthusiastic with the move. The adding of these two new proposed cow testing associations to the five already established in Coos County will rank this county with more associations than any other county in the United States.

WATERFRONT NEWS

Bids for the construction of a new lighthouse tender to be named the Cedar are being advertised for by the lighthouse department. Bids for the purchase of the old light vessel 50 will be advertised for shortly.

The lighthouse tender Manbanita is putting out some new buoys at Port Orford.

The Norwegian ship Nordfarer the largest of her kind in the world, cleared from Astoria this week with a cargo of grain for England.

The Hill steamer Northern Pacific was temporarily registered at Philadelphia on March 17 and on that day sailed for the Pacific coast and will go into service between Astoria and San Francisco about the middle of April. The vessel is an exact counterpart of her sister ship the Great Northern and is commanded by Captain Lapraik.

Loaded with a full cargo the Adeline left out early this morning for San Francisco.

Bringing 600 tons of cement the Nana Smith arrived in at 5 a. m. from San Francisco. She discharged at North Bend and then moved up the Bay. She is scheduled to leave down tomorrow afternoon at 4:30.

Having been delayed two days in Bandon the Speedwell came into North Bend on Wednesday, leaving out for San Pedro yesterday afternoon at 4:30 with lumber and passengers.

No advices have yet been received by the agents here as to when or whether the steam schooner Carlos will return here.

From Portland the Breakwater is expected in sometime tomorrow morning, sailing again for the north on Monday.
