NORTH BEND LIBRARY

The North Bend Library Board held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday afternoon at the library. In the absence of the President, Mrs. L. J. Simpson, Mrs. C. M. Byler, Vice President, took the chair. Other members of the Association present were Mrs. Geo. Hazer, treasurer, Mrs. W. C. Woodbury, secretary, Mrs. C. F. McCollum and Mrs. L. C. Reynolds. The absent members of the board were Mrs. R. A. Wernich, who is out of town and Mrs. Herbert Armstrong, who was absent on account of illness.

The board decided to purchase a new card index as the collection of more than 700 books is too large to handle easily by the present method. The Librarian's report showed 678 books loaned during the month and 890 persons as having visited the library. The management of the library believes it is lending more books in proportion to the number of books on its shelves and the population of the city, than any other library in the country.

The book committee's report showed 24 new books added by purchase and 23 donated, making a total of 47 books added during the month. The treasurer reported all bills paid to date and a balance on hand covering running expenses for two months in advance.

The Library Association is deeply grateful to the Chamblade Club of Marshfield for giving one of its splendid concerts in behalf of the library. The concert netted the library over twenty-six dollars after paying all expenses. The club gave its services to the library thru the generous intervention of its director, Mrs. Wm. Horstall. Aside from the financial assistance, the library association feels itself justly proud for bringing such an entertainment to North Bend as that provided by the Chamblade Club. The club has in it soloists that could sing with great credit before any audience in the country while the choruses show training as one would expect to meet only in a metropolis. That such a musical organization exists in Coos County is cause for self congratulation to every appreciative citizen.

The book committee has received for the library some photo reproductions of a floral calendar from the University of Oregon which the Herbarium of the University is planning to send out from time to time to the public libraries of the state. The idea on the part of the University is to encourage the study of local botany. These photo reproductions are excellent pictures of the wild flowers of Oregon. The sheets contain detailed drawings of the plants including the flower, seed and roots; also suggestive notes on the plants thus illustrated. Every student of Botany as well as every lover of wild flowers, will find these photo reproductions of much interest and of valuable assistance in analyzing and classifying the common plants of Oregon.

The following books have been added by purchase to the library this week. "Mrs. Wiggs of the Cabbage Patch," Two Boy Publishers, Doctor Ramsey's Patient, The Boss of Wild River, When Knighthood was in Flower and the Dazzling Miss Davidson. The series of essays by Ralph Waldo Emerson, known as English Traits, was donated by Mrs. Geo. Mandigo.
