To Tell of Taxes.—J. C. Kendall, president of the Fellowship Club, received a letter today from County Assessor T. J. Thrift stating he will be glad to speak next meeting and promises to explain some secrets of tax collecting. Mr. Kendall doesn't know whether or not he will explain a system for getting out of tax payments.

Start Tide Gate.—Workmen have made a large excavation on Broadway near Curtis for the new tide gate in the Mill Slough drain box and expect to have this finished within a few days, the work being paid for half by the Port and the other half by the city. The engineers believe that this arrangement will keep the water from backing up in the box as it has been doing.

Women May Be Excluded.—Constable Cox states that evidence regarding the allowing of two women in an Empire saloon recently has been gathered and turned over to the District Attorney for use before the Grand Jury. According to a decision of the Supreme Court of this state, rendered this week, ordinances forbidding women to enter a saloon are upheld. This law was fought by E. F. McLaughlin, of Tillamook City and the case was decided against him.

Boy to Reform School.—Probate Officer H. W. Dunham came over last evening with Ralph Walker, aged 14, who was turned over to Mr. Liljeqvist to take this morning to the reform school at Salem. The lad is charged with entering the blacksmith shop of a man named Ames in Coquille on Sunday. Nothing was missing from the shop. The boy claimed that he had gone on an errand for his mother and was not bent on mischief. H. J. Dunham returned from Salem where he had a hard time to get Roy Gardiner into the reform school, the authorities claiming he was too old. It was shown that he would have to answer to a burglary charge here and the school let him in under protest.

Used Bad Words.—L. A. Watts, said to be a bridge foreman on the Willamette Pacific, used naughty words last night on Front street, yelling forth on the midnight air, raving against the police force because they could not find a friend of his he wanted locked in jail. Gordon Smith hustled over across Front street and grabbed the big husky and trotted him over to Carter's hotel. This morning he dropped a five into the general fund, Judge Butler officiating as master of ceremonies. A. L. Abby also came through with a "shiner" for being drunk," but Milton Hurst declared he should have a reduced rate by reason of the fact that he is an old customer. He was penniless, but promised to be good.

Believes Money Forthcoming.—Secretary Henry Sengstacken, of the Port of Coos Bay, after receiving the letter from the War Department stating doubts as to whether there will be any appropriation for Coos River this year, immediately wrote a vigorous letter to Captain Dillon, local government engineer in Portland, emphasizing the fact that the money is badly needed to keep the river navigable in some places. Mr. Sengstacken says he thinks it is too late to get last year's appropriation, but that the \$3000 for this year may be forthcoming.

Councilman Kimball Leaves for Old Home in Nebraska and Cashier Kreitzer to Visit Scenes of Youth

If you feel a slight tilting of the ground today don't get frightened. It's not caused by an earthquake. When two such heavy weights and notable and distinguished citizens as Councilmen and Customs Collector Harry J. Kimball and General Booster and Cashier Dorsey Kreitzer, both leave the city on the same day there is bound to be some disturbance of terra firma.

They go separate ways but both have the same objective point—the old home of boyhood days, but in different states. Kreitzer back to the scenes of his youth in Dayton, Ohio, for rest and recuperation from his recent illness and Kimball to visit his parents in Creighton, Nebraska. Creighton is located near the spot made historic and famous by some sweet singer who warbled that Nebraska was "Way out in the West, the land of the free, Where the 'Big Muddy' rolls down to the sea." And Creighton is right near the "Big Muddy" which is known in the

geographies as the Missouri River. Kimball returns with honors thick upon him as City Councilman and Collector of Customs in the coming port of the Pacific. But his father and mother, whom he hasn't seen for 12 or 15 years, will welcome him back as "son Harry." "They boy—and some of his boyhood pals will probably greet him as "Old Sox."

Dorsey Kreitzer will visit his parents in Dayton, Ohio, where the cash registers come from. Cash—cash register—cashier—it is easy to see the evolution of a Dayton boy into the custodian of the cash in a big bank on the Pacific Coast. His prestige and position, however, will probably not protect his dignity when his boyhood chums greet him. The popular bank director cashier, financier and prominent citizen generally, will have to smile himself when some almost forgotten Bill or Sam yells at him: "Hey, Fatty, when'd you git back?" "Whereja cum from?" and that will be Dorsey's cue to boost Coos Bay.

Many friends will wish both these prominent citizens and good fellows a pleasant visit and a safe return to their new home city on the Pacific that both are doing their share to develop into metropolis.
