Sues for Broken Leg.—Archie Milton has entered a suit against the Coos Bay Manufacturing Company of North Bend, claiming \$4312 for a broken leg, said to have been sustained while employed for the company some time ago.

Easter Services.—Rev. G. Le Roy Hall announced that there will be Easter service in the North Inlet chapel at 11 a. m. on this Sunday and that at 7:30 there will be services in the chapel at Lakeside. He will have charge of the sermons.
