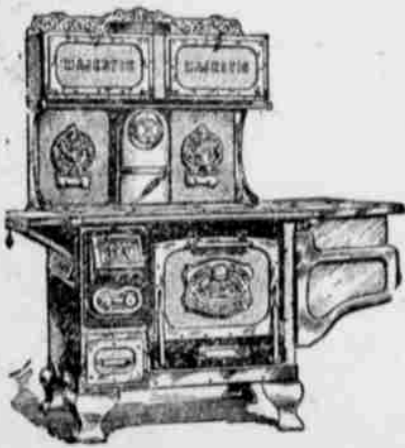

Davis, deputy sheriff, was over today from Coquille on business. He says that yesterday a crazy man was brought in from the camp at Wagner after being several days in a straight jacket. He has been placed in the county jail and later will be taken to Salem to the asylum. The man is supposed to have been a logger. Report Was Untrue.—The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Crowell, formerly of the Smith-Powers Company, but now located at Walnut Grove, California, will be glad to know that the report of the death of their little daughter Georgia was an error. A letter from Mrs. Crowell to Mrs. Moore, of Wagner, stated that little Georgia was well. Elect Trustee.—At a meeting of the Presbyterian church held last evening trustees were elected. Rev. Shimian, of North Bend, presiding as moderator. Charles Lowry was

elected trustee for three years; A. T. Haines trustee for two years; Harry Mohr for two years and A. L. Butz for one year. There were more than 40 members present at the meeting. Saves Over \$700.—More than \$700 has been saved by the advertising committee of the Chamber of Commerce by letting the printing for the 300,000 booklets on special contracts according to the figures they have just compiled. At the first time bids called for on the entire work the lowest bid of a printing firm was \$2,080 and the highest \$3,200. The work has now been done for \$1,362.20.
