of Mr. and Mrs. T. W. French,
news of which was printed in The
Times Saturday. Mr. and Mrs.
French were a noble and noble of
Mrs. A. E. Lathrop of Marshfield,
The Oregonian says:

"The shocking death in an auto-
mobile accident of several notable
Washington financiers leads to curi-
ous reflections on the strange inci-
dents of life. Thomas W. French
and Mrs. French and Mrs. Lathrop
were among the best known of
Washington's early settlers for they
had settled in Washington when it
was part of Oregon territory. Arthur
A. Denny, father of one of the un-
fortunate women, was one of the
founders of Seattle, and his name,
and the name of his family, has for
more than fifty years, been identi-
fied intimately with the development
of that active city. Mr. French, a
son of Charles W. French, well
known through long years in the
newspaper fraternity, of which he
was a worthy member, was himself
a pioneer of 1853, a newspaper man
by inclination and by early profes-
sion, and a historian of territory
and state. He was president of the
Washington Pioneer Society.

These three people were used to
the old ways of transportation—the
ox team and the schooner—but it
was reserved for them that they
should die as victims of the most
modern of all land vehicles.
It would appear that Paper found,
and particularly Seattle, has more
than its share of automobile acci-
dents. Numerous tragedies have
occurred on the dreary south of the
city, and a well-known physi-
cian, Dr. Keight, was a few years
ago run down by an Interstate
truck, while crossing the track in
his motor car, near the scene of
the French-Denny happening. The
state of Washington has done much
for good roads, but it has done lit-
tle in safeguarding its bridges."
