Alvarado Goes East.—Word has been received here that the Arrow Line steam schooner the Alvarado, after a few weeks ago a regular caller in here on her trips between Portland and San Francisco, has assumed a contract for lumber delivery in New York and will start loading at once in St. Helens for the east coast. She will take three cargoes under charter to Charles R. McCormick Lumber Company.

Fish are Jumping.—Coincident with the opening of good weather comes the opening of the good fishing season and followers of Nimrod are planning now for an all-day trip on Sunday up to the head waters of the Coos river and to Ten Mile lake where it is said the wily fellows rise to fly without a moment's hesitation. Milo Pierson when in from Lakeside a few days ago stated that the fishing prospects there are for the best season of several years.

Proofs Extra Good.—Proofs of the new Coos Bay booklet arrived today from the Irwin-Hodson Company of Portland and have been submitted to the advertising committee for its approval. The printing of the cuts is very clear, many of them being scenes about the business streets. The picture of the Breakwater crossing in over the bar turned out exceptionally good. 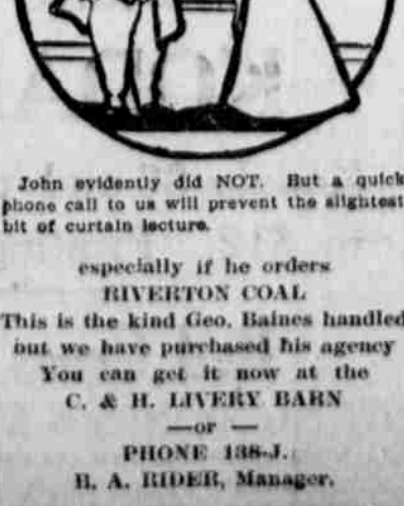

Argues Port Case.—G. T. Treadgold, city attorney of Bandon, returned late yesterday from Salem where he argued before the Supreme Court on behalf of the Port of Bandon and against L. A. Liljeqvist, district attorney, who sought a rehearing of the case once decided against in favor of the Bandon port. Mr. Treadgold stated he is confident that the Supreme Court will hand down its decision by next Tuesday and that it will be in favor of the lower port. The court did not again take up all points of the case but merely granted a rehearing on questions brought up by Mr. Liljeqvist.

Trial Postponed.—Because L. A. Liljeqvist has not yet returned from Salem at 10 o'clock this morning, the time scheduled for the hearing of the two men accused of joy-riding with another's machine, the trial was postponed by Judge Pennock pending the arrival of the district attorney. R. F. Schronborn, formerly connected with Dr. Bull, since his release from jail on a drunkenness charge, has disappeared and for two days has not been seen and the officers are now wondering if he has left the country. His room mate locked him in several nights ago and he then tried to escape through the transom.

Exposition All He Expected.—That the Exposition is the "biggest show on earth," and all that he expected, is the statement of J. W. Watt who returned this morning on the Nann Smith after a week in San Francisco. He says though that the crowds are not exactly what has been expected and that 200 guards about the grounds were released a couple of days ago as a retrenching move. However, says Mr. Watt, this fact seems to have in no wise cut down the exhibits. The large scenic display of Coos Bay on the second floor of the Oregon building has been completed within the last few days and has already attracted considerable attention, he states.

Orpheum Books Road Show.—A beauty chorus, real comedians, good singing, and an all-round good show is promised in the American Musical Comedy company. This company has shown to capacity business at Medford, Grants Pass, Roseburg and are due in tonight from Eugene with fifteen people who are far above the average musical show which has been seen in this city for many moons. While the Orpheum has a large capacity, it is predicted that it will be taxed to its limits again for the first performance Saturday night on account of the rarity of an attraction of this sort being enabled to be assured of their success in Marshfield and surrounding towns.

Guard Coming.—A guard is expected in on the late afternoon stage from Salem today to take Joseph Alexander Peterson north again to the insane asylum. He has been in jail three days, having been picked up in a front street rooming house Wednesday afternoon. Though he has been interrogated several times the man can remember but little. Today after thinking hard for about 15 minutes he finally stated he has a brother in Salt Lake in addition to two sisters in Vancouver, B. C. Sheriff Johnson received word from Salem stating that the man is wanted there in the asylum, having been an inmate a year ago and it is now believed that he might have escaped from there.
