

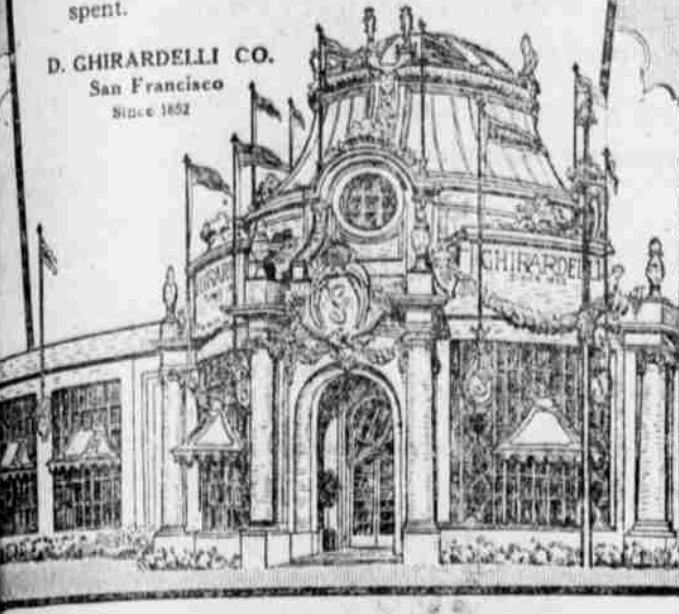

Who Appeared in Piano Recital Thursday

The Chopin group of five pieces was very artistically rendered. Each number was played with a thorough appreciation of the composer's ideas.

The study in F sharp major, one of MacDowell's best compositions, was brilliantly presented and the Grieg "Wedding Day at Troldhaugen" with its vigorous, fascinating rhythm was a gem.

Miss Kruse was probably at her best in the Weber Concertstuck in F minor, which is a most difficult work both artistically and technically.

Miss Kruse responded to hearty encores with Chopin's Prelude in A Major and the Impromptu by Enna. Assisting Miss Kruse was Mrs. R. E. Miller, whose refreshingly sweet voice was heard in "Out of My Soul's Great Sadness," and "His Coming" by Franz, and "If I Built a World for You" by Leza Lehmann and "An Open Secret" by Huntington-Woodman.

Mrs. Miller sang these four numbers in her characteristically pleasing manner and responded to insistent applause with two encores.

Mr. Gjerdrum played accompaniment beautifully as any solo work yet always subservient to the singer.

Both Miss Kruse and Mrs. Miller received beautiful floral tributes. The entire program was followed with the greatest interest and at its close the two performers received the enthusiastic congratulations of the guests.

A special program of music has been arranged for tomorrow morning's service which will include a solo by Mrs. F. E.
