NORTH BEND PUBLIC LIBRARY

Among the good things received at the North Bend public library this week is "Penrod," written by Booth-Tarkington and donated to the library by Mrs. Geo. Hazer. Critics have pronounced "Penrod" the greatest boy story since Mark Twain's "Tom Sawyer." Like Tom Sawyer Penrod is not a story for boys but is a story about boys for grown-ups to read. Every teacher of boys and every parent should read Penrod in order to better understand the charges committed to their care. Anyone who carefully reads Penrod must in many instances be carried back in memory to his own youth and thereby have a brotherly sympathy with childhood, particularly with boyhood during that trying period from 12 to 16 years when a boy wants to be left alone to lead his own life, to test his own powers, to work out his own salvation, in a word to find himself a starting point toward what he aspires to become in manhood, without the trammeling, though often necessary, helpful and even useful influence of parental authority or social convention. Read Penrod if you have not done so; you will feel repaid for your trouble.

Other books received last week by the library are "A New England Nun," by Mary E. Wilkins, Judge Burham's daughter, one of the Pansy books, "The Westerner," by Stuart Edward White, "Country Neighbors," by Alice Brown, "Hans Brinker and the Lady of the Mount," by Frederick Ibsen.

This story by Frederick Ibsen is perhaps the most romantic of his stories, favoring much in theme and style of George Barr McCutcheon's stories which are always so popular with lovers of romance and daring adventure. The spirit of the story is wholesome and good.

TO REGULATE SPEED

Bandon Port Commission Takes Action to Stop Spedding Which is Damaging River Banks

Regulation of the speed attained by boats which traverse the river came up at the meeting of the Port of Bandon held in this city Saturday. The speed which some of the boats develop in their efforts to beat one another in time consumed in passage between Bandon and Coquille has steadily increased until it is becoming a problem. The wash from the propellers and paddle wheels endangers the banks and an ordinance was introduced at the port meeting to deal with this matter. As originally proposed the ordinance limits river carriers to a speed of ten miles per hour. This limit of speed is subject to revision and may be changed some in the final passage but the port seems determined to take some action of the kind.

The commissioners also appropriated \$5,000 for piers to be driven so as to strengthen the banks between Bandon and Coquille.

The gap on the north side of the jetty will also receive attention from the commission. A call has been asked for bids for this work.

F. D. Butler, of the F. S. Loop Lumber Company, and Captain F. A. Perry, formerly master of vessels operated by the Simpson interests of Coos Bay, have embarked in the stevedoring business at Portland.

The government dredge Colonel P. S. Michie moved from the Northwest Steel Company's dock last evening to the plant of the Willamette Iron & Steel Works, where the alterations being made to her will be completed.—Telegram

In the cargo of the British steamer Hazel Dollar, which loaded at Marshfield for Kobe, was a consignment of 2272 bales, or 1,220,000 pounds, of wood pulp, valued at \$23,181. Her manifest has been received at the Portland custom house.—Telegram

That she may be overhauled from stem to stern and truck to keel the gasoline schooner Rustler this morning went on the ways at the Kruse and Banks yards in North Bend. She will be repaired and repainted before again entering into the Rogue River run.

With miscellaneous freight, the gasoline schooner Roamer is today ready for sea, bound for Gardiner and Florence.

This morning the George W. Elder crossed in from Portland bringing 57 passengers and will leave down at 6 p. m. for Eureka.

At 9 a. m. the Breakwater left her slip and down the Bay bound for Portland.

For lumber the steam schooner Yellowstone, of the Swaine and Hoyt line, crossed in at 8 a. m., and will be here probably until Wednesday loading lumber at North Bend for San Francisco.
