WHERE COIN GOES

ACCOUNTING MADE OF RIVERS AND HARBORS BILL.

Eureka .Receives .Three .Times as Much as Coos Bay for Harbor Work; Coos Bay May Get More

Accounting for every dollar apportioned under the \$29,000,000 Rivers and Harbors Bill for bays and inland waterways is made in a letter just received by Henry Sengstacken, secretary of the Port, Eureka, where the Michie of Coos Bay, has been at work, received more than three times as much for improvements as the local harbor and Portland close to 30 times as much.

A million and a half goes for work at the mouth of the Columbia river and close to half a million more for work in the vicinity of the Rose City while the port of Grays Harbor in Washington dug into the official sum for \$450,000 to improve her facilities.

That there is a possibility of an increase in the Coos Bay appropriation was the expressed belief of Captain Macgem on Saturday. Wednesday he will hold a second consultation with Major Morrow, the government engineer in Portland, and he then expects to know definitely if anything more will be allowed Coos Bay.

In the list it is shown that San Francisco harbor receives \$12,000 this year and Oakland harbor \$80,000 and San Pedro gets \$75,000. As stated in the first announcements from Washington the Sluslaw will receive \$117,000 and the Coquille \$76,000.
