

\$34,000 IN BONDS

NORTH BEND COUNCIL AUTHORIZES ISSUE

Action Necessary To Redeem Outstanding City Warrants, Plan Street Improvement

Issuance of bonds aggregating \$34,000 to redeem all outstanding general warrants was authorized by the North Bend city fathers at their meeting of last night. Reports of the city recorder showed there is on hand at present but \$2,761 to cover warrants issued by the city. In ordinance form the bonds have been approved though seal bids will probably not be opened until June.

Quarterly reports were submitted by the City Recorder Maybee, Wharfinger Warren Painter and City Treasurer John Greves.

Culprits are more of a curiosity in North Bend than actualities, according to Mr. Maybee, who as police judge, stated that in the past three months but seven men appeared before him for wrong doings. Three of these came on drunk charges and in every case, but one, the seven paid fines.

Receipts for the quarter, showed Mr. Maybee, were \$19,637.26 and the disbursements, \$6,243.47, though he pointed out the fact that the first large sum includes special assessments made for street work, about \$4,000, also about \$7,000 on the sale of improvement bonds and approximately \$5,000 in special assessments. His report was ratified by the council.

During the quarter \$259.10 was collected for wharf rates, according to Warren Painter.

The city treasurer showed the general fund to contain \$2,761, the special fund \$379.18 and the improvement bond account, \$5,952.33 now on hand.

Nothing was brought up regarding the North Bend paving the Warren Construction Co. now grouping their machinery on the grounds preparatory to starting work, though there will be a special meeting of the city fathers called for Friday night to consider this matter and also the establishment of grades for street improvements.

Virginia street, it is proposed, to open through from a point close to the city dock to Pony Slough, the resolution for this work having been passed last evening, and McPherson will be graded from Virginia to Ver-

mont. City Engineer Cavanaugh reported the cut on McPherson would not be excessive to put the street through as proposed.

GOLD IN CEMETERY SOUGHT BY MINERS

But Catholics Won't Sell Small Burying Ground Near Yreka, Cal., Said to Contain \$40,000 in Metal

YREKA, Cal., April 14.—Hydraulic mining companies are eagerly bidding for the small patch of ground occupied by the Catholic cemetery (Sawyer's bar, near here, but the church officials say they will not sell at any price. It is estimated that the cemetery contains \$40,000 worth of gold. Mining operations have been conducted up to its very edges, and the miners declare that the cemetery appears to be the richest bit of ground in the region. Although the little congregation is very poor it will not consent to the desecration of the holy territory and the relatives' bodies which have lain there since 1857, no matter what the bid.
