MARK DAVIS CASE

AMOS ROGERS PROVES AN INTERESTING WITNESS

Details Some Early History of the Coos Bay Country and Its Pioneer Settlers.

(Special to The Times) SAN FRANCISCO, April 20.—Amos Rogers, an old resident of Coos River and a brother of Stephen Rogers, has given probably the most important evidence yet presented in the Mark Davis estate case.

Mr. Rogers left Coos County a number of years ago but he has a remarkably clear conception of early days in that section and his familiarity with the principals in the Davis estate case will probably prove valuable to the contestants.

According to Mr. Rogers' story he was residing on what is now known as the James Landrith ranch on Coos River when one of the important incidents on which the present case is based took place.

Mr. Rogers has since died, and of course this part of Rogers' evidence will be only circumstantial. He told of the witnesses of the killing of the Indian, giving their names later testifying that Davis acted in self defense and on this ground Davis was acquitted.

Rogers, according to those who heard him tell the story, showed evident dislike for the late Mark Davis. Besides the evidence which reflects unfavorably on the late Coos Bay pioneer, Mr. Rogers' work in many details which would be somewhat of a shock to dependants of other early well-known Coos County residents but it is not likely that this will become public.

PORT MAY ISSUE BONDS

Steam Commission's Art Not Restricted, Rules Court, in Case Just Decided.

EUGENE, Ore., April 20.—The Steam Port Commission has the right to vote and sell harbor improvement bonds at will, up to the legal limit of 10 per cent of the assessed valuation of the district, and is not subject to a referendum vote of the people, according to a decision in the Circuit Court rendered by Judge Shipworth. The case may be carried to the Supreme Court, otherwise this removes the last obstacle for the sale of \$1,000,000 improvement bonds for work expected this year.

The case in the Circuit Court was that of H. H. Taylor, of Beach, against T. J. Newley, of Marion, secretary of the Steam Port Commission, and against the individual members of the Commission.
