**Confirmation Lecture.**—At the Episcopal church this evening at 7:30 there will begin a series of confirmation lectures preparatory to the visitation of Bishop Sumner.

**Sunday Sermon.**—On Sunday at 11 a. m., the Rector of the Episcopal church will preach on the subject: "Prosperity versus Hard Times," based on the words in the Book of Job, Chapter iv. 5: "It toucheth thee and thou art troubled."

**Sunday Excursion.**—Capt. H. E. Edwards has arranged a special excursion of the Millcoma which will leave at 5:30 for Allegany on Sunday. If weather conditions are favorable D. L. Foote will take up one of his autos and the run to the Golden Falls will be made.

**Keeler Goes South.**—D. J. Keeler, of Bandon, who was arrested in Roseburg three weeks ago on the charge of deserting his wife, has returned to his home, the differences are patched up and he has left with his wife for San Francisco on the steamship Elizabeth. It is not known whether or not they will return.

**Lodges Unite.**—Reports from Portland state that the Ancient Order of United Workmen and the auxiliary order The Degree of Honor plan to combine and thereafter women will be admitted to the men's organization. Both are insurance orders. The Grand Lodge of Oregon which is a separate jurisdiction met in Portland this week. S. B. Cathcart, and Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Rood attended from Marshfield.

**Asks County Aid.**—Mrs. Frank Cameron, wife of Frank Cameron, former Agitator editor now in the county jail on a bootlegging charge, has sent a petition to the county court asking that she be allowed a maintenance fund. She states that she is sick in bed unable to get up and is

absolutely devoid to finances. Cameron lost his appeal to the Supreme Court and was sent over two months ago to serve 150 days in jail.

**Trout Are Asked.**—That he be sent a large jar of brook trout for showing in the Coos and Curry County exhibit at the Fair is the request of J. A. Ward. He states visitors are doubly interested in such displays. The samples of white cedar, he states in a letter to the Chamber of Commerce, have already been worth the trouble. A 50-foot length of fish net, partially as a decoration and partially as a showing of the fish industry here is also requested.

**Grand Jury Takes Business.**—Justice of the Peace Pennock declares that he will see the next "wave of crime" doesn't come simultaneously with the opening of the grand jury. The fact that it has this time has resulted in the taking of the six alleged forgers direct to the grand jury without preliminary examination in the Justice Court and the same has been true in the case of Harry Brewster, who is said to have robbed and thrown Gunder Sevretsen into the bay a week ago.

**Court Grants Petition.**—By a decision of yesterday Mrs. W. S. Wheeler, wife of Captain Wheeler, deceased, is given the use of the family residence on Ninth Street for a period of 12 months and a widow's maintenance of \$50 a month. According to the terms of the will of the deceased she was not allowed these grants, but petitioned the court and the result was a legal contest that waxed sharp and heavy for several days. The will granted the wife only a one half dower interest in the real property.

**Big Reward Posted.**—Circulars received at the police station from Boise, Idaho, announce that a reward of \$300 is out for the arrest or for information that will lead to the arrest of either of two Austrians who, on December 19, 1914, cashed bogus checks to the amount of \$2,500 on the Intermountain Railway Company. It is noted that the operations there were also on a Saturday night and after the banks had closed. It is possible that some of the men captured here may be later identified as the men wanted in Boise.

**Bolt in Oratory.**—Eric P. Bolt, son of Mr. and Mrs. George N. Bolt, tonight will appear as one of the six orators at Salem in the State Prohibition Oratorical Contest. He will represent the University of Willamette. The other six colleges in the contest are Albany College, Pacific University, Pacific College, Eugene Bible University and McMinnville College. Eric Bolt during the time he has been at Willamette University has made an enviable record for himself in oratory and several times has represented his institution.

**Repair Emergency Hose.**—Firemen at their drill of last evening took the big machine to emergency hose stations in West and South Marshfield where the buildings were cleaned out, and the hose brought back to the station for cleaning. The hose carts are being repaired. In both places youngsters had played with the chemical tanks, completely discharging them. It is considered fortunate that none of them got the acid on their clothes. It eats through the cloth and skin and is extremely dangerous. Hereafter the tanks will be encased in cabinets, locked.

**Many go on Ferry.**—Many are taking advantage of the night ferry service between here and Eastside, according to the word received by the County Commissioners. The signal makes regular trips, starting in at 7:30 p. m. and from thence up until about 11:30. This service has been in effect since April 1 and is maintained at a cost of \$100 a month to the county. But the convenience is well worth the "whistle" say those who reside in

Eastside and who are now able to come here in the evenings to entertainments, returning to their homes afterwards.
