No Council Tonight.—There will be no meeting of the city fathers this evening. At their last meeting they adjourned for a two-weeks period as there was no urging business to call them together this week.

Takes Week-end Rest.—William Cooney, after a strenuous week, at least it was judged so from the fact he had spent all his money, was taken in tow on Saturday night because of his unstable condition and given a private room in the Carter Hotel. This morning he told the judge he had no money but a kind friend came forth to negotiate the loan and the general treasury was richer by a shining "dime."

Hospital is Mentioned.—In the last issue of the Saturday Evening Post there is a long account given of the big Belgian Hospital at La Panne, Belgium, 17 miles from Dunkirk, where Dr. E. V. Morrow, formerly of Marshfield, expects to spend several months. The story is written by Mary Roberts Rinehart, who made a thorough study of the hospital, its inmates, and the conditions surrounding the treatment of the wounded there.

Is Severely Burned.—Putting gasoline bandages on his arms this morning, W. S. Dreyppard, an old man who rooms above the former location of the Parisian Dye Works, corner Second and Market streets, came too near the fire and in the resulting blaze his arms were severely burned, most of the skin coming off in large

patches. His clothes took fire and his narrow escape from burning to death was due to the timely arrival of friends who tore off his clothes. The blazing clothes caused a fire alarm to be turned in but there was no need of the department. A doctor dressed the wounds.

Brother Dead.—Mrs. O. Hansen of North Marshfield and one of Coos Bay's best known pioneers, last week received word of the death of her only brother, Chas. R. Phillips, at Kanopolis, Kan. He had lived near Cunningham, on the Coquille, for years and went to Kansas to be married but he developed an attack of pneumonia which proved fatal. The bride-to-be was Miss Lura Reed who visited at the Hugh Hastings home at Cunningham last summer where Mr. Phillips first met her. He was born in Missouri in 1853 and came to Coos Bay the year of his birth with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. Y. Phillips.

Took Wonderful Views.—S. U. Bunnell, of Pasadena, California, who with Mrs. Bunnell, has been here for the past six months taking panoramic views of Coos Bay and vicinity, expects to leave the first of the week for California. Some of the large pictures, taken by a No. 8 panoramic machine, are considered wonderful. One taken a few days ago, shows the Smith Mill, Eastside, a good view of the bay and Marshfield. Another of the bar taken at Coos Head as well as the sand spit and the bay as it winds up toward Empire. Mr. Bunnell has left some of his scenes at The Owl.

Improves Summer Home.—A new hot water system was installed yesterday in the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Peck on South Coos River, making that place now one of the best improved homes on the river. Louis Gorr went up yesterday morning on the Rainbow to supervise the plumbing. He was accompanied by his wife. Mr. Peck secures his water from a spring far back on the mountain and in his house are complete hot and cold water connections. Workmen were busy yesterday grading up a series of terraces in front of the W. S. Chandler home, next door to the Peck bungalow. These will be sown to grass and concrete walks laid about the big residence.

Build Up Winchester Bay.—E. L. Robinson, of Marshfield, has been engaged by Warren Reed, of Reedsport, to lay out a summer townsite on Winchester Bay, dividing a 50-acre tract adjoining the bay on the South into building lots, thus providing for a summer resort on that spot which has for years brought many visitors from outside during the warm months. The bay is protected from the winds, has plenty of clear creeks, the woods are just behind while but a little to the west is the open ocean with its miles of beach stretching down to the Coos Bay bar. A trail will be built over to the bay and later on, so it is said, an auto road will be constructed. It is claimed that 2000 people last year visited Winchester Bay.
