It was expected that a large shipment of cement would come up on the Nann. The other work was not stopped.

**More Plans Come.**—Two more copies of the plans and specifications for the removal of the old life saving station to the entrance of the harbor and the erection of new buildings were received yesterday by Port Secretary Henry Sengstacken and are available to the contractors who expect to bid on the work. This makes three sets of plans that have come from the Washington office.

It is also expected that the council will pass an ordinance for the new sewer systems proposed for Union and Sherman Avenues.

**Quartette Renders Thanks.**—A letter of thanks on behalf of himself and the other members of the University of Oregon quartette was received here yesterday from Prof. R. H. Lyman for the college men of Coos Bay who aided in the entertainment of the singers, when they were here a week ago. "The spirit shown will not be forgotten I can warrant," writes Prof. Lyman, "and I can say that we hope again to come to Marshfield." The quartette is now thinking of taking a trip to San Francisco at the close of the college year early in June.

**Is Official Band.**—That the military band of the Oregon Agricultural College is the official Oregon band at the Exposition is the information in a letter just received at the Chamber of Commerce. In June the college musicians expect to be in San Francisco and then will give a series of concerts in the Oregon Building. The fact that they have to pay their own expenses, says F. A. Holmes, manager of the band, causes them to seek financial aid of the commercial bodies of the state. In return the band states its willingness to aid in every way possible, musically especially, in advertising the various sections of the state.

**Aeroplanes At Night.**—Passengers on the Nann Smith today told of the wonderful sight they saw Saturday night when they crossed out of the Golden Gate. Arthur Smith, air king who has assumed his title since the death of Lincoln Beachey, his aeroplane a mass of electric lights and shooting fireworks and sky rockets sailed through the darkness. Far out over the bay he circled around the Exposition grounds and then to the Presidio and back again.
