ED CHING, CHINESE YOUTH, 19 YEARS, TAKEN BY GUARD

Son of Ti-Ti, Once Notorious Character On Bay, Two Thousand Inmates In Asylum

Another chapter to a pitiful life was added today when Ed Ching, a young Chinaman of 19 years, left North Bend accompanied by several of his countrymen and came down to the Gasgo landing where the youth was delivered up to G. K. Harrington, traveling guard of the states insane asylum. Ed Ching is a son of Ti-Ti, a notorious Chinese woman

who died about two years ago.

For months the boy has been taken care of by the Chinamen at North Bend. He is an imbecile and finally they tired of having him about and sent to the asylum authorities to be relieved of their burden.

This is the third trip here in six months that Mr. Harrington has made. Practically all of his time he is on the road, from one place to another all over the state gathering up more inmates for the state asylum.

There are in the Salem institution at this time at least 1,500 men and women, said Mr. Harrington, At the branch in Pendleton there are 400 more, making a total of 2,000 instance that the state is now supporting. Of this number, said the guard, two thirds are men and the ages of them all average closely between 35 and 0 years of age.

Virtually all the work about the grounds and buildings is done by the inmates, the ones that are not vio-lent. There is a farm in connection where is raised most of the foodstuffs. New buildings are often erected by the men of the asylum, under the direction or the keepers and skilled mechanics.

The lawns, the laundries and the kitchens are kept up and in first class condition atways by the asylum in-
