

TOWN OF POWERS MAY GET FACTORY PENTLAND IS FREED

Continued from Page One. these creeks the road will be built on contour lines, it was explained, and reaching the head of the canyon, switchbacks will be put in to get still farther up the mountain sides.

Population Close to 1,200 Powers is a new town. It is situated on the old Wagner ranch and is only a week old. Powers and its immediate vicinity boasts a population already of close to 1,200 people.

Business Houses Everywhere George W. Craig, former proprietor of the Bunker Hill boarding house now conducts the Gannon restaurant, a two-story frame structure on Main street.

On the other side of the same block, Spencer and Shelley, of Myrtle Point are erecting a two story general merchandise store. On the other corner, W. K. Wiseman, of Marshfield, is starting a furniture and hardware concern.

Back toward the hills, but a little distance, is the site of the new \$18,000 school building now proposed. Talk is rife of an electric lighting system, of sewers, of telephones and of a public water works.

At the end of the track, the main logging track, an eight stall engine house is already built and the machine shops are now under way.

But by no means are all the people in Powers. Across the river, a little way and there is a bridge between is the Morris ranch which has been divided into neat acre tracts which have been literally "gobbled" up by loggers.

At a small cost they have been able to secure acre home sites and build thereon neat little cottages around which already have been planted vines and flowers. Some of the tracts have been plowed and harrowed and fruit trees planted in orderly rows.

Frank Morris formerly owned this site. He is a man of about 50 years. For 33 of these years he has lived on the Coquille, 12 of which were spent in logging.

J. T. Ross logged for years. Now he has the big general store on the Morris ranch. B. H. Smith, of Marshfield, has just put in a barber shop. There is another further down the street.

Mrs. Utterback, whose husband, a brakeman on the road, was killed several weeks ago, now conducts a neat little restaurant on the Morris ranch. She was well treated by both the company and its employees and the building was erected for her by Frank Morris.

Henry Schroeder conducts the Casino moving picture house. Yesterday his place was used for a dance and all afternoon was crowded by followers of the light fantastic, some of them not so light as others, but all had a good time.

All day long, A. H. Powers was besieged with visitors who bombarded him with volley after volley of questions. Good naturedly he answered them all.

Hereafter there will be a regular train service to Powers. It will leave here every morning at 7:10, making the regular trip to Coquille and Myrtle Point, and continuing on to Powers, leaving there at 10:30 a. m.

MAY MOVE COQUILLE PLANT TO NORTH BEND

Archie Kruse, Who Bought Outfit in the City — New Logging Camp Opens Archie Kruse, who recently bought the box factory plant and equipment of the defunct Coquille River Manufacturing Company at Bullards, was here Saturday night.

Mr. Kruse was reticent about his plans for the business, excepting to say that he expected to get it in operation soon. However, parties from North Bend stated that it was confidently expected that the factory would be secured for North Bend.

Nothing has been done with the North Bend Box factory which Manager Kern sold to the Southern Pacific when the company bought his factory site as a right of way.

Mr. Kern retained the veneer plant machinery and it is understood that the latter has been sold to California parties. The Swayne & Hoyt people and L. J. Simpson were figuring on buying the Kern box factory plant from the Southern Pacific.

Nelson & Weaver, who have taken the contract for logging about eighty acres of Port Orford White Cedar on the L. T. Matthews ranch on South Inlet, have started in work.

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FORD CAR SALES TO BREAK RECORD

SALES MANAGER HAWKINS SAYS 300,000 MARK IN SIGHT FOR YEAR—PROFIT SHARING PLAN EXPLAINED. PLAN TO SELL 500,000 NEXT YEAR OF THE MARVELOUS MACHINES. Telling of the constantly increasing popularity of the Ford cars throughout the world and prophesying a continued increase in the use of the marvelous machines, N. A. Hawkins, sales manager and right hand man of Henry Ford, has been explaining the company's great system in Portland where he has been spending a few weeks.

By July 1 Mr. Hawkins declares 300,000 Ford cars will have been sold since August 1, 1914. When the Ford officials set their mark for 12 months at 300,000 cars they didn't dream of the European war which cut them off from sales of 40,000 cars, but nevertheless they are now certain of establishing the record a month ahead of the allotted time.

Mr. Ford was not forced to do this by competition, for he had no competition either here or abroad. "Now it is no longer a question of how many Fords we can sell, but rather how many can we build. And next year our output should run as high as 500,000 cars.

Mr. Ford when he reduced the prices on his cars at the start of the year, makes a total of \$54,000,000 that he has spent on this indirect advertising.
